## BLUEHILL.

Mr. Bakeman espoused the cause of the Federalists. The sympathy he expressed for his adopted country and people caused him to be hated by the English and Tories.

After one of the contests between the English and American his house was used as a hospital for the wounded Americans.

For this some English soldiers were sent to seize him, but he, having timely warning, fled in a boat. A few days later the English seized his stock of cattle, about twenty in number, and over a hundred sheep.

Mr. Bakeman went to Bath, where he was joined by his family. During his stay there he was engaged in making salt from sea water.

When peace was declared he returned to find not even the foundations of his house. The English had taken it down and removed it to Castine, where it was rebuilt. It still stands near the Arcadian hotel and is known as the old Dr. Man's house.

Mr. Bakeman went once to Holland after he came to this country, and on his return brought a small apple tree which he planted in his garden. It is still alive. It is immense in size, and over 100 years old.

Mr. Bakeman died in 1800 at the age of sixty-nine years, bequeathing to the name of Bakeman the same indomitable will and the same sense of right and justice that upheld him during his persecutions. There are a number of younger Bakemans, but of the old family, Mrs. Grindle was the only one.
