WHY IS IT?

EDITOR EXPOSITOR—Editors are supposed to know everything and it is with this supposition in view that I ask you the question. Why does so much of the grain in this section find its way to other markets than our own? While awaiting your answer regarding this matter I venture the simple answer that it is because our buyers do not pay enough. Why is it? Simply this: Both of our elevators are owned by Port Huron grain dealers. The gentleman who have charge of them are simply on salary, and can not, therefore, make the price dictated by their better judgment. They must pay simply what their employers instruct them to. The result is that during the greater part of the present season prices have been, on the average, several cents lower than at other markets. As high as 22 or 23 cents per bushel difference is reported. According to current reports the same state of affairs has existed at all points on the narrow gauge roads where the elevators are owned and controlled by Port Huron dealers. To us it appears as though Sanborn, and Botsford Bros. were buying the market paying just what they wish, and no more, and we believe that to be the right solution of the matter. Last year our buyers here bought on a strictly competitive basis, Mr Ward then owned the elevator now owned by Sanborn. The result of the fair prices paid was that business in Brockway Centre was exceedingly good and every thing was booming. This season wretchedly low prices have been paid and business has been much poorer with our merchants. One thing is very certain, if this thing is kept up much longer the death knell of this town might as well be sounded. A good market makes a good business town. Should another party attempt to buy grain here, he would perhaps be driven to the wall, as Sanborn and Botsford Bros are interested in the railroad and would secure such high rates to their competitor that he could not pay them and pay higher prices for grain. We do not wish to take Messrs. Hickey and Mills to task in this matter, but those in whose employ they are.
