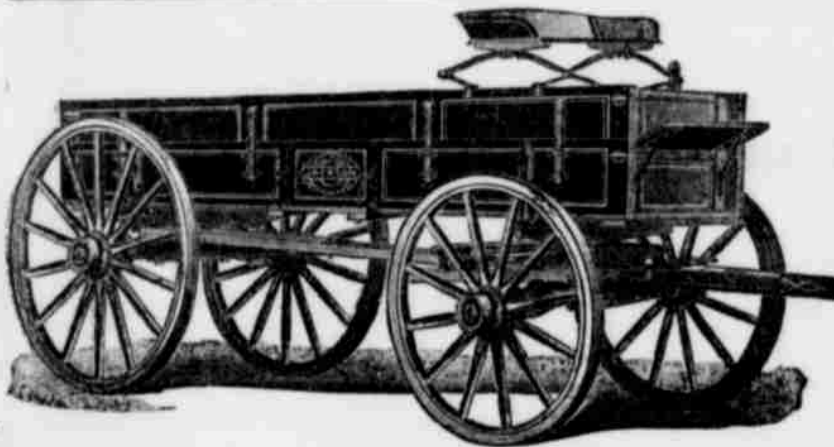

REDUCED TO ASHES.

The Large Barns of John Mathews at Roseburg Burned to the Ground Wednesday Morning, Together with 30 Head of Cattle.

Word reached Yale Wednesday morning that the two large barns adjoining each other on the farm of John Mathews at Roseburg were consumed by the fiery fiend at 2:50 o'clock in the morning, together with 30 head of fat cattle, hay, straw, farming implements, etc. The loss is estimated at about \$3,000 with \$1,500 insurance. Cause supposed to be incendiary.

Mr. Mathews has suffered the loss of four barns in the past twenty years, three being burned on the same spot where the last one stood. Five years ago the same morning the barns then on the place were burned and at the same time 12 horses, 10 hogs, 4 cows, 1 calf and 9 sheep perished in the flames. The loss was about \$3,500 with less than half that amount of insurance.

It not seem that some person greedily inclined was determined to ruin Mr. Mathews and this same devil, whoever he may be, would no doubt take the old gentleman's life if the opportunity offered, for a human being that is so heartless as to destroy the lives of dumb animals, could not be trusted in any way whatever.
