CIRCUIT COURT TERM OPENED

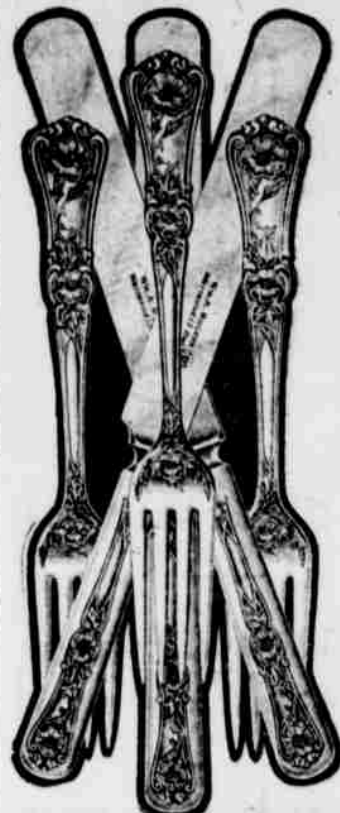
Strike Cases Not to Be Started for Several Weeks

Farwell after graduation from the college of mines went west where he held a number of positions. When last reported to the college authorities, he held a position at Emporium, W. Va. He has been residing in Detroit, Mich. He claimed to have performed a great many jobs which would show further than any man of the present day and intended in time to sell it to the United States government.

There were some eight or ten bidders on the contract. This in itself will be a considerable undertaking, as the ground area of the structure will call for moving a large quantity of material. A basement will extend under the entire building.

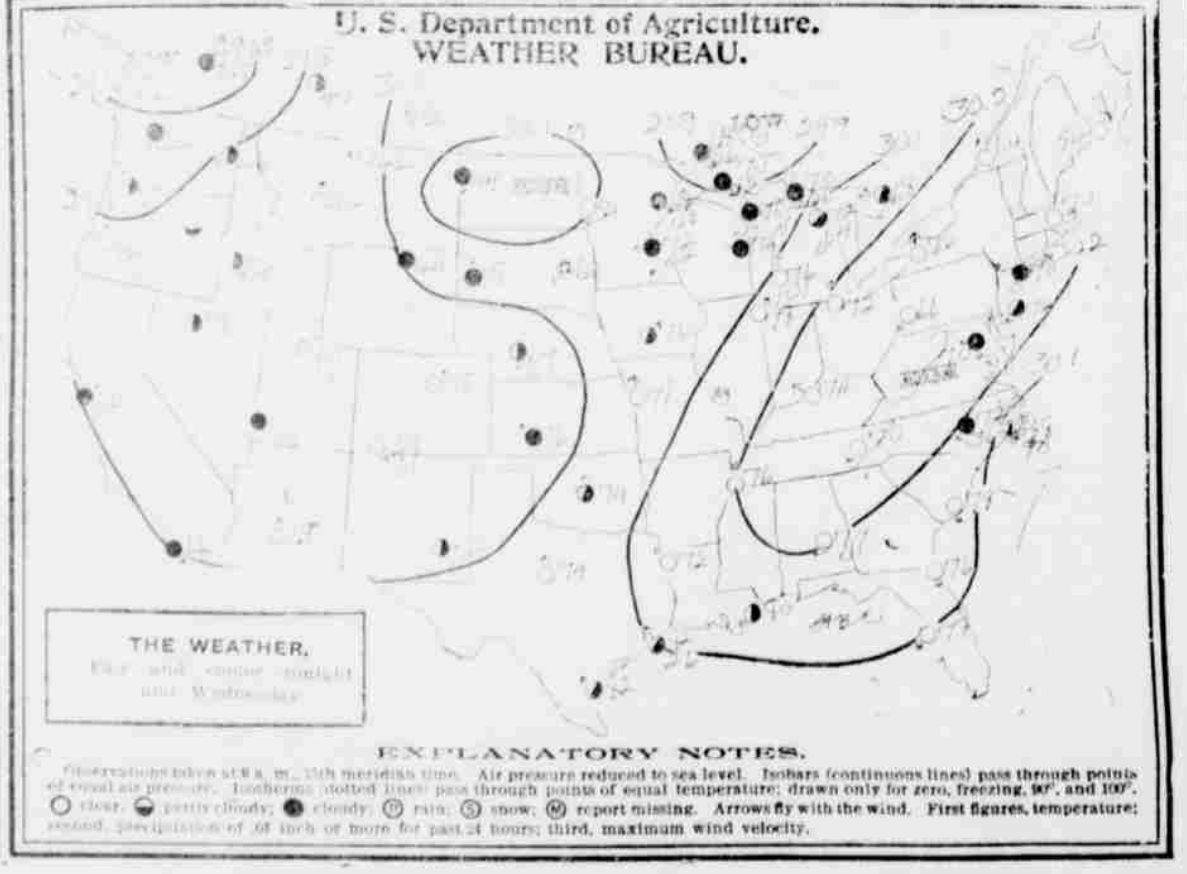
