

LOSSES IN BIG STORM ON THE LAKES PILE UP

Today's Developments Increase Number of Lives and Steamers Lost

SCORES OF SAILORS PERISH

The James Carruthers, Largest Canadian Freighter, Believed to Have Gone Down

BOAT SINKS AT ISLE ROYALE

Goderich, Ont., Nov. 12.—Reports from points along the Canadian shore of Lake Huron point to a heavy loss of life and shipping in the recent storm.

Wreckage found here indicated that the James Carruthers, the largest Canadian freighter on the lakes, is lost. An oak picked up this morning outside this harbor was marked "James Carruthers."

A life raft and five oars from the steamer Argus were found below here this afternoon.

Sunk Off Angus Island? Fort William, Ont., Nov. 12.—The steamer Leathel is missing and it is feared it may have struck the rocks of Angus Island and sunk, as she was loaded with steel rails.

Barge With Seven Lost. Menominee, Mich., Nov. 12.—It is reported that the barge Plymouth sank in Sunday's storm near Gull Island, just off the entrance to Green Bay.

The tug Martin, which had the Plymouth in tow, arrived in a sinking condition late last night. It was first reported she had been lost, as well as the Plymouth, with a crew of nine.

Overturned Steamer Identified. Port Huron, Mich., Nov. 12.—The capsized steamer, the identity of which has been hidden by the waters of Lake Huron since she was discovered late Monday afternoon, is the Regina of Toronto, Ont.

Northern Queen Crew Safe. It was definitely decided late last night that no lives were lost in the wreck of the steamer Northern Queen of Kettle Point on the Canadian shore of Lake Huron.

WALDO ABANDONED TO UNDERWRITERS

Steamer Wrecked at Manitou Is Given Up by Owners

Capt. J. D. Duddleson, master of the steamer L. C. Waldo, wrecked on Manitou Island off Keweenaw Point last Friday morning, who with his crew reached Houghton in safety yesterday afternoon, today announced that the Waldo had been abandoned to the underwriters.

To Visit Turret Chief Wreck. Captain Thomas Paddington of the steamer Turret Chief, which lies high up on a reef six miles east of Copper Harbor, will return to the scene of the wreck tomorrow to ascertain the extent of damages and report to the owners of the craft in Toronto.

Despite the fact that they drifted more than a hundred miles out of their course and for twelve hours, in a blinding snow storm, they were completely at the mercy of the sea, the members of the crew appear to think light of their harrowing experience.

Captain Paddington's Story. Captain Paddington, a rather diminutive man, smiled as he was approached by a reporter for The News.

"Did we realize what might be our fate?" he said. "No, and I don't think the crew cared. They are a reckless lot, you know, and a lot of good fellows. We knew we were aboard a good ship, and as long as we could keep her off the beach, we were safe."

"We were bound from Medlyn, Ontario, to Fort William, and when about 110 miles northwest of Whitefish point, the gale struck. The wind came out of the northeast and blew us along at a rapid clip. We couldn't go ahead so I lashed the wheel and went ahead so the gale brought a heap of snow so we couldn't see anyway, and there wasn't any use in hanging onto the wheel."
