### COLLECTION OF MINERALS LOST

Gift of John Merton to Wellesley Destroyed in Fire

With the destruction of College Hall the Wellesley college dormitory that was destroyed this week, involving a loss of \$1,500,000, a valuable collection of Lake Superior and Western minerals, the donation of John Merton, of Calumet, was destroyed. The loss of this asset is much regretted by heads of the college as the collection was regarded as second only to the extensive collection at Harvard college.

The task of collecting the specimens represented two years of effort and specimens of practically every known mineral formation to be found in the western and Lake Superior mining districts were included in the collection.

Among the three hundred students who were in the hall when the fire was discovered was Miss Helen Merton, the daughter of Mrs. James Merton. With barely sufficient time to escape, Miss Merton was unable to save any personal effects. During the time the college is closed Miss Merton will visit in New York city.

Other upper country students at Wellesley are the Misses Marion Shields, Alice Weber and Marie Tardiff, all of Houghton, and Miss Francis Cook of Calumet.

### INQUEST IS CONDUCTED

Accidental Death Verdict of Jury Called by Coroner Fisher.

The coroner's jury composed of E. W. North, Patrick Walsh, Fred Johnson, John Brevik, John H. Bennett and William Cron yesterday held an inquest in the C. & H. hospital to ascertain the cause of the death of Alex Kovack which was reported last evening. A verdict of accidental death was returned.

Probably the most important witness was John C. Curtis, foreman of the party with whom Kovack was working in the first level of the No. 7 shaft. He testified that he and his men had been engaged in herring down loose ground and that he went to investigate what work remained to be done, advising Kovack to remain where he was, out of danger. While Curtis was engaged in looking over the remaining hanging, Kovack wandered away a few steps and came directly beneath the loose rock which fell on him, causing almost instant death.

### HITCH YOUR LETTER TO PARCEL POST PACKAGE

ORDER PROVIDES FOR DELIVERY OF MESSAGE AND MERCHANDISE AT SAME TIME.

To add to the popularity of the parcel post, Postmaster General Burleson has signed an order which will permit the attaching of a letter to a package when both bear their respective rates of postage and are addressed to the same individual says a Washington dispatch. The sending of a communication with a parcel post package heretofore has not been permissible.

Postal officials pointed out today that it is often of the utmost importance that the sender of an article of merchandise write a letter concerning it, and that, in order to avoid delay and facilitate the transaction of business, it is highly desirable that the parcels and communications be delivered at the same time. It was with this in mind that today's order was issued.

The letter is not to be enclosed in the package, but is to be tied or otherwise securely fastened to the outside.

### PREPARING TO GROW POTATOES

Osceola Boy Scouts Secure Money to Rent and Fence Land

Reports have just been received by the Osceola Boy Scouts which show that the proceeds of the recent entertainment, "The Little Heroes of the Revolution," far exceeded their expectations, and together with the balance remaining in the treasury of the organization, will be sufficient to meet the rent for the little garden plot leased from the Osceola Mining company by this organization, also to fence it. It has been decided to do this work as soon as the weather permits, then to have the land plowed and prepared for cultivation.

The boys were so successful in their experiments as potato growers last year that they will raise the same kind of a crop this year, planting about two acres of the Sir Walter Raleigh variety. The membership of the scout troop, which is an outgrowth of the anti-cigarette club, is now about twenty-five making it possible for the boys to cultivate a much larger area than last season. The experience gained will also be helpful and better results are looked for.

Last fall the boys sold their entire crop of potatoes to the Houghton County Agricultural society, to be used as seed, obtaining a price considerably higher than that of the more common varieties were bringing in the market.

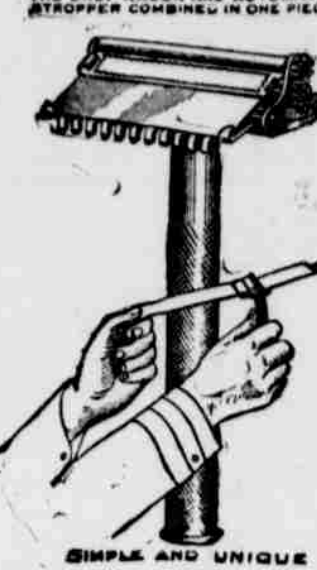
