COMMENCEMENT HERE JUNE 18

Hon. O. T. Corsans, Speaker, is Well Known Educator

With the announcement a short time ago that Hon. O. T. Corsans of Columbus, Ohio will be the commencement speaker for the Calumet Public Schools and that the commencement exercises will be held in the theater on Thursday evening, June 18, the members of the class of 1914 are beginning to make preparations for the close of the school year.

Hon. O. T. Corsans is an experienced educator, having held the position of superintendent of public instruction in the state of Ohio for a number of years. He is now the publisher of one of the foremost educational journals, a work that is recognized as standard in all educational circles, making his headquarters in Columbus, Ohio. Hon. Corsans is a very fluent and eloquent public speaker and the faculties of the copper country schools feel fortunate in having his acceptance as the commencement speaker. He will deliver the commencement address at all of the copper country high schools.

The class of 1914, including both the February and June classes will number about 150 students.

In the preparation for the commencement exercises, the matter of dress has not been overlooked. Simplicity will be the keynote in the matter of attire this year. The young ladies have decided to wear white dresses of the plainest material obtainable. The young men have decided upon a combination of white flannel trousers, black or dark blue coats, soft white shirts and green ties.

STEP TOWARDS CIVIC BEAUTY

Unightly Objects Along Red Jacket Road to Be Removed

An important stride towards greater civic beauty is likely to be undertaken this summer in the improvement of that section of the so-called Calumet field, bordering on Red Jacket road. While no definite plans have been made for this undertaking, there is little doubt it will be accomplished.

The completion of the Colosseum rink and the grading of that portion of the field occupied by the rink is the first step towards improving these grounds, and now it is suggested that the remainder of the field, extending from the Union building to the rink be leveled and all unsightly objects removed and the whole seeded with grass. This step would undoubtedly be appreciated by residents of the town and would be in line with similar improvements made elsewhere and the campaign which is being conducted by the civic improvement workers, among them the Calumet Playground association.

The Calumet Storage Co., owners of the Colosseum, plan a number of improvements to the Colosseum grounds this summer also to the rink. The directors will hold a meeting soon to decide upon what material to use for a flooring for the rink. A sectional hardwood floor on a concrete base and an asphalt floor have been suggested. Either would be suitable for roller skating, to which amusement the rink will be devoted this summer. It is hardly possible this floor can be laid in time for roller skating during the spring months.
