LOCAL SCHOOL ON ACCREDITED LIST

Six Copper Country Institutions Are Accorded Honor

Superintendent H. D. Lee of the Hancock public schools has been advised that the high school is again on the accredited university list, the announcement of which is pleasing to students teachers and friends of the school. In addition to the local school there are five other copper country and twenty-one upper peninsula institutions on the list.

The school is also included in the accredited list of the North Central association, whose aim is to bring about a keener competition and better acquaintance between colleges and schools. One of the principal objects of this association is to consider educational problems, through co-operation in the high schools. Also they wish to promote physical, intellectual and moral well-being among the students by raising the standards to a high degree of efficiency. The association is a voluntary organization

consisting of representatives of both secondary colleges and schools.

The standards for the accredited secondary schools for the present year are many. In the first place to be included in the honored list fifteen units for graduation are necessary, while the association discourages the plan of more than twenty periods a week. The minimum scholastic attainment of teachers of academic subjects must be equivalent to graduation from a college affiliated with the association. After 1915 the preparation of the teacher shall include at least eleven semester hours in education.

No school whose record shows an excessive number of pupils per teacher, based on average attendance, shall be accredited, the association recommending twenty-five as a maximum. These requirements are pointed out as the most essential.

It is the belief of the association that practicing conservatism will eventually work to the highest interests of all. The association aims to accord credit only to those schools which possess organization, teaching force, standards of scholarship, equipment and spirit of corps of such character as will unhesitatingly commend them to any educator, college or university in the north central territory.

COUNCIL WILL MEET TONIGHT TO GRANT TWENTY-FIVE SALOON PERMITS.

Members of the Hancock city council will meet in the city hall this evening in an adjourned meeting to take action on applications for liquor licenses. Thirty-two applications have been received and only twenty-five can legally be granted. Of the thirty-two applications received by the council body eighteen are for licenses in its business on Quincy street, four for Hancock street, including the Elk's temple, six for Tecumseh street, Railroad avenue, two, Ethel avenue and Bigot street each one.

Each of the members of the council has been supplied with the names of applicants to enable him to decide just how he will vote on the matter. The city fathers will go into executive session and ballot on who will receive the licenses.
