SPRING FINDS HOUSES IN LAURIUM AT PREMIUM

DEMAND FOR TENEMENTS INDICATES ACTIVITY IN REALTY TRANSACTIONS.

With the resumption of industrial place in the copper country, Laurium was one of the first towns in the district in which conditions readjusted themselves and today finds the town more prosperous than at any time in the past decade. Evidence of this is obtained from the demand for houses, tenements as well as business blocks and residences are as scarce as the proverbial hen's tooth. Real estate dealers are sanguine over the prospects of the village and they predict a building boom in the next year or two.

Practically every business block on Hecla street and Lake Linden avenue, regardless of its dimensions, is occupied and a half-dozen new enterprises will be opened in the next ten days. The Charrier building on Hecla street, formerly occupied by the Finlayson store, will be occupied shortly by a furniture company and a grocery store will occupy the vacant structure adjoining the Peninsula Heating & Plumbing company's store on Hecla street. The Vivian building, formerly the postoffice, will be occupied shortly by a five and ten-cent store and the Strand building at Second and Hecla street soon will be occupied by a grocery. In addition to these changes, Lake Linden avenue will be the scene of more activity and contracts for several new buildings have been let recently.

KILLING THE HOOKWORM.

Pest Is Being Eradicated in the Southern States.

In eleven Southern States the campaign for the eradication of hookworm is being conducted along the most aggressive lines. For the quarter ended Sept. 30, 1913, 133,125 microscopic examinations were made for hookworm. This parasite of the human body is a bloodsucker and does much injury to the intestinal lining, where in adult life he makes his abode for six to ten years unless dislodged by thymol treatment. During the three months 33,671 persons have been treated for the disease.

Of this number 4447 persons were reported by physicians and 29,224 persons were treated in free dispensaries conducted by the health departments of the State and county in Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, Tennessee, Texas and Virginia. In these eleven states there are 1942 counties, of which 417 have made local appropriations to aid in defraying the expenses for the free examination and treatment. The work is very popular and it is usual for a fifth to a third of the entire population of a county to be examined to ascertain if infection exists. In Lee county, Virginia, 9012 persons were recently examined and in several counties over 8000 persons have been examined.

In every county where this work is conducted infection and sanitary surveys are made on a uniform basis, so that the health authorities may know just what problems confront them. By making comparisons with future surveys the progress being made can be ascertained. Approximately \$15,000 has been spent during the past three months by the local agencies for the extension of this work. The Rockefeller sanitary commission, with headquarters at Washington, is lending liberal support to the work.

In addition to getting the infected people treated; the sanitary and infection surveys made; conducting extensive county campaigns through the use of lectures, the printed page, and the free dispensary demonstration work; enlisting the press, etc., much progress is being made in getting sanitary closets installed as a means to stopping soil pollution and ultimately controlling the channel through which hookworm disease and typhoid fever spread.

The opening of the baseball season which was scheduled to take place in the driving park yesterday afternoon between the Laurium Independents and the Lake Linden Hustlers, was postponed owing to cold weather. Despite the fact that the mercury remained near the bottom of the tube, a hundred fans braved the cold and clung to the bleachers for an hour, anticipating that the game would be played in any event. Their disappointment, at that, was keen. Efforts to organize a county league have been futile and fans will have to be content with the independent article. Promoters had in view a Portage-Torch Lake-Calumet circuit, but only two teams could be mustered. The Laurium and Lake Linden teams will play their postponed game on May 24.

SIGN CONTRACTS TUESDAY.

The village council will meet tomorrow evening with Contractors Chatelet & Vairo and Paul P. Boehm for the purpose of signing contracts and concluding other details preliminary to beginning contracts on municipal work. The council has made no alterations in the town hall plans and work by the contractors likely will begin this week. The street work which will be undertaken by Paul Boehm will be discussed and a limit of this contract will be determined at tomorrow's meeting.
