DENIES CUNNINGHAM WILL GET NEW POSITION.

Governor Ferris Declares Labor Commissioner Not Slated for Job.

Lansing, Mich., Aug. 8.—Gov. Ferris says nothing doing for Labor Commissioner Cunningham for the \$3,500 job as a member of the state industrial accident board. Wednesday, upon his arrival here, the governor said he might have one and perhaps two appointments to give out. During the afternoon Labor Commissioner Cunningham held a conference with the governor. Before and after his departure The Tribune was informed by a Democrat close to the executive head to watch out for developments on Cunningham. However, the chief executive now says there was nothing doing and will not be. One of his close followers says union labor does not stand a show for the reason the unions have not given the chief executive a name that appealed to him. The successor to Ora Reeves, Republican member, appointed by ex-Gov. Osborn, and reappointed by Gov. Ferris, is still a mystery.

FOOD COMMISSIONER COMING. James Helme, State Official, Will Accompany "Health Special". Residents of the copper country will be interested to know that James V. Helme, of Lansing, state dairy and food commissioner, will be here the latter part of this month, coming with the "Health Special" of the Michigan Agricultural college. Mr. Helme is known throughout the state for his energetic campaigns to enforce the pure food laws. Accompanying the food commissioner will be a number of assistants, who will explain the exhibits carried by the train. The first lap of the statewide tour of the train, which was begun Sunday, has been completed. The "Health Special," as the train has been called, consists of three coaches. One coach has been given over to the pure food department, one to the dairy department and a third to the state board of health. Each had been filled with pictures and models designed to expose the dangers with which citizens of Michigan are confronted. Perhaps the most interesting corner in the "pure food" car is that which has been devoted to the exhibit of faulty weights and measures. This exhibit is in charge of one of the inspectors of the department. Faulty scales, short measures and a whole museum of other devices much employed by dealers in cheating the public are shown. Then on the walls of the car have been placed placards announcing that fully 49 per cent. of the weights and measures inspected by the department have been found to be faulty.

WOODEN WALKS BEING TORN UP

Street Improvements Planned in Bollmann's Addition

Following the visit of inspection by the Laurium street committee Thursday, and the approval by that body of proposed improvements brought to the attention of the council last Tuesday evening, workmen are now engaged in tearing up the old wooden sidewalks on North Ahmeek street, preparatory to the construction of cement walks.

Residents of this section informed the council that the condition of streets there was deplorable, and also that a majority of the taxpayers were perfectly agreeable to a plan whereby the walks might be installed at once and paid for by the owners of the property improved within sixty days. An investigation convinced the street committee that the complaint as regards the condition of the street was justifiable and that something should be done, but it is useless to undertake the work until the walks are installed. Men were engaged to tear up the walks at once and to have the grading completed as far as possible by the time the sixty-day contract has been signed up by all of the taxpayers. Then work will be pushed vigorously and the street also will be repaired. Early this summer, residents of North Pevasive street petitioned the council for cement walks, but were unable to secure the desired number of signatures to a contract agreeing to reimburse the village for the improvement within sixty days. Recently individual property holders have asked for and been given the street grade and it is believed they contemplate independent action, but so far nothing of this nature has been attempted. It is possible the individuals favoring the improvement will have the work done while the street forces are at work on Ahmeek street. Pevasive street also is in need of attention, but this cannot well be done until the sidewalks are installed.

The condition of Sixth street, on the east end, was found to be in better condition than was reported, except in

one place at the corner of Sixth and Froquois streets, which will be given attention immediately. East of the village limits, the street is in bad shape, but it would seem the duty of those who use the highway most to place it in repair.

Excellent roadway is being made with the laying of the cement pavement on Lake Linden avenue. Contractor Paul P. Roshin has a large force of men engaged in this work.

SIN AND WOE IN TROUBLE. Laurium Chinamen Arrested and Fined For Noise and Disturbance.

A. Sin and L. Woo, Laurium celebrities, were arrested and arraigned before Justice David Armit this morning on the charge of creating a noise and disturbance. The pair are alleged to have celebrated a little too freely on First street last evening and made themselves obnoxious to well-behaved citizens. Both protested their innocence, but the justice could not see how a man named Sin could keep out of trouble and thought it the most natural thing in the world that Woo should follow after, so he levied a fine of \$3 and costs on each. The fines were paid.

NO CHANGE FOR PYTHIANS. The proposition which has been before the order of Knights of Pythias for years, to reduce the age limit from 21 to 18 so as to admit more young men, was defeated at the supreme lodge convention which was just closed at Whitpain. Local Knights of Pythians who have been deeply interested in the plan, and who took a referendum vote at the request of the state grand lodge a year ago, will learn the outcome of the proposal's consideration at the hands of the supreme lodge with interest.
