U. S. Examiner Spends Busy Day Quizzing Aliens

United States Naturalization Examiner Ralph Mosier spent a busy day today examining applicants for citizenship in the Houghton county circuit court.

The court room was crowded to capacity when court opened and Mr. Mosier did not find time hanging heavy on his hands for the entire session.

Most of the applicants for full citizenship papers have been in this country but a short time, a majority of them just along enough to permit them to become citizens.

Mr. Mosier will remain in Houghton for several days. Tomorrow he will attempt to complete his examination of the remaining applicants.

David McNeil, who pleaded guilty to breaking into a dwelling in Ripley, was placed on probation and ordered to pay \$25 as the costs of the court.

Antti Mursu, charged with non-support, third offense, was sentenced to from 1 to 3 years, with a recommendation of 2 years in the Ionia reformatory.
