## CAPTURES ALMOND'S NEK

This Important Pass Taken by Gen. Buller After Long, Hard Fighting.

### BOERS ARE DEFEATED NEAR ROODEVAL.

**Kelly-Kenny Reports Successful Movement of His Troops at Point Where British Communications Are Cut—Methuen Still Unheard From—Steyn Reported Near Beit.** London, June 12.—The war office posts the following dispatch from Gen. Buller: "Headquarters in Natal, June 11.—We forced Almond's nek to-day. It isn't marked on the map, but is the last defile to Charleston forts. The enemy were in considerable force, with several guns in position. The brunt of the fighting fell upon the Second Dorsets, who carried the position at the point of the bayonet, and the Third cavalry brigade, who were heavily attacked on our right from very broken country round the mountain. I hope our casualties are less than 100, which, considering the extreme length of the position, is much less than I expected. "The whole attack was directed by Hillyard, whose dispositions were extremely good. The artillery, Tenth brigade, and Third cavalry brigade did most of the work. "Boers Defeated Near Roodeval. "The war office has received the following dispatch from Gen. Kelly-Kenny: "Bloemfontein, June 12.—Our troops from the north are at Homingspruit (south of Roodeval), where the Boers cut the British lines of communication, having defeated the enemy. They will be at America siding to-morrow at eight a. m. "Gen. Knox moves out from Kroonstad to intercept the enemy. "Further particulars later. "No Word from Methuen. "London, June 12.—The following dispatch has been received at the war office from Gen. Forester-Walker, in command of the lines of communication in South Africa: "Cape Town, June 12.—The following is from Kelly-Kenny: "June 11.—No communication from Methuen since June 7. He was fighting June 9 to the north of Vetchkop. Steyn is near Beit. "The British prisoners sent to Vrede are well treated. "Plentiful Crop of Reports. "A plentiful crop of reports has been filtering through Lorenzo Marques. According to these Gen. De Wet, with 15,000 burghers, is marching on Johannesburg, the Boers have retaken Bloemfontein, where President Steyn again occupies the presidency; the British have sustained a severe defeat at Elandsfontein and have also lost 750 killed and wounded and 150 prisoners in a fight at Vredefort. Nothing from any other sources lends color to these stories, with the exception of the last, which is probably the Boer version of the disaster to the militia battalion of the Derbyshire regiment at Roodeval. "In regard to President Steyn being in Bloemfontein, a dispatch from Masera, Basutoland, dated Monday, June 11, says President Steyn was then at Vrede, 200 miles from Bloemfontein. "Buller Making Progress. "Gen. Buller seems to be making substantial progress, and ought soon to possess the railroad at Charleston (in the northern extremity of Natal), whence, presumably, he will advance on Heidelberg and effect a junction with Lord Roberts. "A dispatch from Lichtenburg, dated June 11, says 60 Johannesburg mounted policemen, with a Maxim gun, have surrendered to Gen. Huater. "A probable explanation of the reports that a British force is moving through Swaziland comes in a dispatch from Port Elizabeth, dated June 11, announcing the return there of the British cruiser Doris from Kosi bay, whither she had taken a number of whaleboats with the object of landing an armed force, presumably part of a plan to penetrate into Swaziland. The Boers, however, got wind of the expedition, and the force was not landed. "Cabinet Crisis Continues. "According to a Cape Town dispatch the cabinet crisis continues. It is added that should Premier Schreiner secede from the bond, as he threatens, his action would place the bond in the minority in the assembly. "Mr. Schreiner has accepted the resignations of J. X. Merriman, treasurer, and J. W. Sauer, commissioner of public works. "Among the members of the yeomanry killed at Lindley was W. T. Power, proprietor of the Canyon ranch in north Texas, and son of Sir W. T. Power. "Makes University One of His Heirs. "Des Moines, Ia., June 12.—Former Gov. Drake, of Centerville, who was here attending the commencement exercises of the Drake university, announced that he had made the university a joint heir with his five children in his will. His property is valued at \$2,000,000, and the university will receive \$500,000. Gov. Drake has already contributed in various benefactions \$200,000 to promote the institution. "Murderer Commits Suicide. "Sioux City, Ia., June 12.—Charles Reinhart, a wealthy farmer near Odebolt, who murdered his wife last Wednesday and then shot himself, ended his life by cutting his throat. "Reciprocity with Portugal. "Washington, June 12.—The president has issued a proclamation formally announcing the establishment of a reciprocity agreement with Portugal. "Captures Almond's Nek. "The Street Railway Strike Has Assumed Such a Serious Phase That People Call for Protection. "St. Louis, June 7.—The strike is becoming more serious and citizens are trying to force the governor to call out the militia. "St. Louis, June 8.—There was renewed rioting yesterday, one policeman and one boy being fatally shot and many other persons hurt. "St. Louis, June 9.—Mobs of women yesterday denuded, beat and smeared with green paint three women patrons of the Transit company. "St. Louis, June 11.—The thirty-fourth day of the street car strike was marked by four men being killed and half a dozen or more injured less seriously. "St. Louis, June 12.—Mobs tried to drag a baby from its mother's arms yesterday, tore clothing off two women and fought another girl for riding on street cars. The mayor issued a proclamation warning citizens to stay within doors and establishing a curfew for children. Thus far ten persons have been killed during riots. "KEEPS HER WORD. "Philadelphia Is Ready to Turn Over Big Convention Hall to Republican Managers. "Philadelphia, June 11.—The republican convention city of 1900 has everything in readiness, practically, for the quadrennial gathering of the republicans of the United States. All the hard work and all the anxious moments attending the preparations for the coming of the republican hosts are over, and the city is beginning to dress up to receive its guests. The magnificent convention hall, on the west bank of the Schuylkill river, is complete in every detail, and awaits only the hour of noon, June 19. "The seating capacity of the place is close to 16,000. The main floor is provided with 34 entrances. The main entrance is at the north, and the stage is at the southern end, eight feet above the main floor. The press stand for 500 working newspaper men is directly in front of the stage, and is four feet above the main floor. In front of the press stand is the space for the delegates, which is exactly in the center of the hall. In back of the delegates are the alternates' seats. "THE NATIONAL GAME. ## RIOTS IN ST. LOUIS.

The Street Railway Strike Has Assumed Such a Serious Phase That People Call for Protection.

### GEN. PIO DEL PILAR, A RABID HATER OF AMERICANS, CAPTURED ON THE OUTSKIRTS OF MANILA.

**IS A MASTER OF GUERRILLA WARFARE. Results of the Campaign During One Week—Secret Service Men Make Arrests—Members of the Commission Preparing for Work—Insurgent Documents Discovered.** Manila, June 9.—Gen. Pio del Pilar, the Filipino leader, has been captured near Manila. Pilar has long been looked upon as the most desperate and uncompromising of the Filipino generals. He is a rabid hater of the Americans, and, excepting Aguinaldo, has made more trouble to the United States troops than any other of the rebel leaders. He is a master of guerrilla warfare and handled his troops with wonderful cleverness. He has usually operated in the vicinity of the Laguna de Bay and along the Pasig toward Manila. "Americans Killed. "Manila, June 11.—The results of the campaign during the past week were nine Americans killed, including a captain and lieutenant, and 23 wounded, including two captains. One captain was captured. The Filipino loss is reported to have been 220 killed, 63 wounded, and 140 men and 160 rifles captured. The disturbances were chiefly in Panay and Central Luzon. The capture of the notorious Pio del Pilar by the native police has greatly discouraged the insurgents. "Volunteers Arrested. "The secret-service men arrested in Manila a colonel of Filipino volunteers. They also seized a number of documents which showed that the headquarters of the volunteers were within a quarter of a mile of the palace, almost under the noses of the American military authorities. "Preparing for Work. "President Taft and the other members of the Philippine commission spent last week chiefly in securing quarters and arranging their offices. They, however, met a large number of Filipino politicians and commercial leaders. The heavy work of the commission has not yet begun. One of the foremost questions is how and from what material to organize a civil force with which gradually to supersede the army as a governing machine. "Insurgent Documents. "The great store of insurgent documents discovered by Gen. Funston, together with some interesting papers which Capt. Smith found in possession of Gen. Pantaleon Garcia, throws interesting side lights upon the Filipino government. Most important of the lot is Aguinaldo's plan for the uprising in Manila, which was drawn by him at Malolos, in his own handwriting in the Tagalog language, and bears the date of January 9, 1899. "Another General Captured. "Manila, June 12.—Lieut. Johnson, of the Forty-first infantry, reports the capture of Gen. Sison, who was Gen. MacArthur's opponent in the railroad campaign, and who has recently been operating with 1,000 guerrillas in Pampanga and Bulacan provinces. "Four Persons Murdered. "West Newfield, Me., June 12.—George W. Goodwin and three members of his household were murdered and the house in which they lived near here set on fire by the murderer, whose motive was presumably robbery. The dead are: George W. Goodwin, Mrs. Elsie R. Horne, his mother, 76 years of age; Scott Goodwin, his adopted son, 20 years of age, and Fred Bertsch, a hired man. "Cuban Teachers Coming. "Washington, June 9.—The quarter-master general has completed arrangements for the transportation to the United States of 1,483 Cuban school teachers, who have decided to take advantage of the summer course of free tuition offered them by Harvard university. This course will last from July 1 to September, when the teachers will be returned by the war department to Cuba. "Crops Destroyed. "Guthrie, O. T., June 9.—A terrific wind, hail and electrical storm visited this section Friday morning. Thousands of acres of wheat were ruined by hail and wind, much corn and cotton riddled and many orchards stripped of all fruit. In one township all their crops, and the damage will aggregate many thousands of dollars. "An Iowa Tragedy. "Sioux City, Ia., June 7.—Charles D. Reinhart, owner of the Reinhart flats in Sioux City and a wealthy land owner, shot and killed his wife Wednesday at Odebolt, Ia., and then shot himself. He cannot live. He deliberately planned the crime. "Congress of Negroes. "Montgomery, Ala., June 8.—Negroes are to hold a national congress in Montgomery July 25, 26 and 27. The speakers will include Bishop Turner, Booker T. Washington, Prof. Council and other prominent negroes. "Killed by Lightning. "Jacksonville, Fla., June 8.—Tom Jenkins, Peter York, Harry Davis and Peter Wiggins, all colored, were killed here by lightning. "Lived 115 Years. "Kokomo, Ind., June 6.—Mrs. Lucy Pulley, the oldest negro woman west of the Alleghanies, died in this city, aged 115 years.
