Conditions in the Philippines Are Not Serious.

GOVERNOR TAFT REPORTS

Not Single Call For Free Distribution of Rice—People Planted Large Crops—Scarcity of Cattle—10,000 Carabos to Be Imported.

Washington, June 9.—The war department has just made public a report received from Governor Taft, replying to statements made by Lieut. Gen. Miles, after his visit to the islands last year.

NEAR EIGHTY MARK

Conservative Estimate of Number Who Perished

IN SOUTH CAROLINA'S FLOOD

Mill Industry Suffers to Extent of \$3,000,000—Citizens of Spartanburg Raise \$3,500 For Relief—Mighty Cloudburst Caused Flood.

Columbus, S. C., June 8.—Through the great flood of water is passing on to the ocean, laden with debris of every description and the swollen streams are subsiding in the Piedmont region, the losses of life and property are increasing, and a conservative estimate places the property loss at not less than \$3,500,000.

Spartanburg, S. C., June 8.—The latest reports are that approximately fifty-five persons were drowned Saturday in the floods at Pacolet and Clifton. No list of dead is yet available here, but it is supposed that most of the dead were mill operatives.

Charlotte, N. C., June 8.—Developments in the devastated mill settlements at Pacolet and Clifton do not lessen the horror of the situation there, though it is believed the loss of life will not exceed fifty people.

Boy Drowned in a Post-Hole.

Detroit, Mich., June 8.—A little son of Eugene Graetzke, in Hamtramck, fell into a post-hole back of the saloon of ex-Ald. Hansjosten and was drowned, the hole being filled with water from the recent rains.

Ann Arbor, Mich., June 8.—The management of the "Inlander," the University of Michigan literary magazine, has been assumed by the Quadrangle society, and hereafter the business control, as well as the policy of the magazine, will be under Quadrangle direction.

Negro Lynched in Georgia.

Macon, Ga., June 9.—W. Cope Winslow, Jr., whose father was one of the leading members of the Georgia bar, was instantly killed by a negro named Banjo Peavy on the former's farm near Fort Valley Monday.

State Will Have to Pay.

Lansing, Mich., June 8.—Former Attorney-General Owen, who has charge of the state's interest in the case brought by the general government to recover some \$38,000, which was in the St. Mary's Falls canal ship fund when that improvement was turned over by the state, says that the effect of the Federal supreme court's action in overruling the demurrer filed by the state is that Michigan will have to pay the general government the above sum and possibly interest since 1882.

Grand Rapids Pioneer Dying.

Grand Rapids, Mich., June 8.—Aaron B. Turner, who fell in Cincinnati two weeks ago when on his way home from the south, breaking his hip, is very low and not expected to live but a few hours. He is 81 years old and close confinement as a result of the injury makes his case hopeless.

ALL UNDER WATER

Suburban Towns of St. Louis Suffering From Floods.

THOUSANDS ARE HOMELESS

Twenty Lives Known to Have Been Lost—Traffic Paralyzed—Property Loss Will Total \$3,000,000—Madison Refugees Drowned While Fleeing.

St. Louis, June 9.—So great an extent of territory is covered by the flood, so constantly changing are the conditions as the water creeps higher and renders the situation more chaotic and so unreliable are the various rumors of the devastation that a summarized summary of the losses of lives and property cannot be obtained, but information from apparently the most reliable sources showed the situation to be as follows:

River stage, 37.5 feet, stationary. Probably a slight rise before today when the highest stage shall have been reached.

Over two thousand acres of rich farming lands under water.

All of Venice and the greater parts of Madison and Granite City under water.

Twenty lives known to have been lost.

Twenty-five thousand people are homeless.

Freight traffic completely paralyzed and passenger traffic practically so.

The shipping and manufacturing district of East St. Louis for three miles along the river front under from two to eight feet of water.

Hundreds and probably thousands of head of stock drowned.

East St. Louis threatened with complete inundation.

St. Louis flooded only along the water front.

Entire property loss estimated at \$2,000,000.

The Levee Broke.

The climax of the flood came Sunday night, by the breaking of a levee near Granite City, a wall of water six feet high rushed down upon Madison sweeping houses from their foundations and drowning fifteen refugees who were vainly fleeing for their lives.

Hundreds of persons were forced to the roofs of their floating houses and an appeal was sent to St. Louis for assistance. Every effort was made to force steamers against the heavy current four miles north to the stricken town, but it was noon before the steamers Mark Twain and Annie Russell, lashed together and their engines working under every ounce of steam, after five hours of battle with the current, were able to reach Madison.

For the balance of the day and into the night the work of rescuing refugees from floating or flooded houses, tree tops and various high places proceeded, and there being no place to take them nearer than St. Louis, they are pouring into the city by hundreds, wet, hungry and dispirited.

It is more than probable that the estimate of twenty lives lost thus far is below the actual number.

John Arnold, who escaped from North Venice, brought the report that a house containing thirteen occupants was swept away Sunday night and all were drowned.

River thieves are looting the various houses.

Mayor Cook of East St. Louis issued a proclamation today ordering all business suspended and calling upon every male citizen to lay aside his employment and render service in preventing the inundation of the city.
