### THREATENS A LIBEL SUIT.

Ike Marcus Says That He Will Get After an Iron Mountain Paper.

A fellow named Ike Marcus was arrested here Wednesday on advice from the sheriff of Ashland county, Wis., who wired to Sheriff Holmes to hold the man pending his arrival. The charge alleged against Marcus was embezzlement and it was preferred against him by his partner, Chas. Cohen, of Ashland, Wis. Marcus immediately employed counsel and was about to apply for a writ of habeas corpus when it was learned that the sheriff would be here the following morning and the matter was let rest until then.

The sheriff arrived in due time minus requisition papers and with no very satisfactory reasons for the man's apprehension. Marcus' story is that he and Cohen were in partnership; that he went to Duluth and sold a carload of old junk belonging to the firm and took the money for it as he had a right to do under the partnership arrangement. He came here instead of returning to Ashland which gave rise to the charge of embezzlement brought by his partner against him. An Iron Mountain paper received the information that he was an embezzler and printed it and Marcus threatens to start criminal libel proceedings against the proprietors.
