Amasa Is Rapidly Being Put in Fitting Attire to Celebrate.

## GOOD TIME IS PROMISED.

Crystal Falls Athletes Coming Up After the Prize Money—Pay-day at Crystal Falls Will Keep Many Away.

From one end of the town to the other there is evidence of preparations for the grand celebration to be held today. Evergreens are being hauled in at a wily rate to give shade on both sides of the main street. There are several bowery pavilions erected and numerous refreshment stands in all parts of the town.

One great interference with the attendance from Crystal Falls to the celebration is the fact that the mines at that place pay today, a fact which will keep almost all of the mine employes from visiting our town. ## Underground Telephone.

The first underground telephone system to be installed in an Iron county mine was put in at the Hemlock the past week. It is working nicely and proving to be one of the handiest improvements made at the mine in a long time. The system starts at the office and makes the different engine houses and dry and then goes to the shaft where the wire descends to the levels below. Certain stations are selected below where there is generally an attendant at work and a receiver placed therein. Thus, if the captain wishes to speak to the engineer, the superintendent or someone on the level above he has simply to step to the phone nearest and give the required number of rings. The system works well and is a money saver. It was put in by Mr. Nelson, of Iron Mountain, formerly with the Range Telephone company.
