THE PEOPLE'S MUTUAL

Annual Meeting of Members—Reports Show Most Flourishing Condition. From Ionia Standard.

The annual meeting of the People's Mutual Fire Insurance Company of Ionia, Montcalm and Clinton counties, held at Opera house, Ionia, on Tuesday afternoon, was largely attended by members from all of the counties, President John E. Taylor in the chair.

The annual report of the Secretary showed 588 members added during the year 1905, and a net gain of 315; and \$896,249 insurance added, being a net gain of \$677,747 during the year, with a total amount at risk December 31, 1905, of \$7,045,675. There were 102 losses during year, amounting to \$15,466.95. Of these 67 were from lightning.

The secretary supplemented the report with the following resume, showing the growth of company in recent years:

"In submitting this report for your action, I wish to congratulate the membership of the company upon the bright outlook of the future. The growth of the company during the past two years has been phenomenal. \$875,000 new insurance was written in 1904 and \$869,000 in 1905—over \$1,740,000 during the two years, while 590 new members were added in 1904 and 588 in 1905; 1178 in two years. Today the company numbers over 4,500 members and has at risk nearly 8,000,000 of insurance. During the 16 years that I have served the company as secretary—16 of the best years of my life—I have seen it grow from 861 members to its present large membership—over 5 times the number. To the loyal, zealous work of directors and a score of solicitors, it is due credited the great success achieved in building up the Company so that today it stands the strongest Mutual in Michigan. During the time I have served as Secretary over \$260,000 have been received and disbursed, not a dollar of which to my knowledge has been lost to the company. And now, in conclusion, I wish to express my warmest thanks for the courtesy and kind acts of friendship I have received at your hands."

Lucas M. Miel, of Belvidere, ex-county treasurer of Montcalm county, and a member of the board of directors of the People's company, was unanimously elected president. He is a man of the highest standing in his county, familiar with the company's affairs, and his election is a cause of general satisfaction to the membership.

V. H. Smith of this city was re-elected vice-president without contest, no other

name being presented.

There were two nominations for secretary and treasurer—T. G. Stevenson, present incumbent and S. B. Newcomb of Montcalm county. The result of the ballot was as follows:

Mr. Stevenson was declared elected. The result of the election for members of the board resulted in the choice of the following: Philip Cook, Westphalia, re-elected; Charles F. Dickinson, Bloomer; Joseph Houck, Dallas, new; Wm. Dowling, Victor, new; Geo. C. Youngman, Cato, new. These men are all pronounced of the highest standing, and were the choice of the members in their respective localities.

The members of the board holding over are: George Peter Johnson, Greenville; Chas. S. Rice, Portland; J. S. Newell, Maple Valley; Mark Pennell, DeWitt; Jared L. Holbrook, Jeeenbush; Edwin Porter, Douglass; Jas. P. Throop, Ferris.

At a meeting of the board, held immediately after adjournment of members, J. S. Newell was chosen chairman.

The board, at the meeting previous to annual meeting, ordered an assessment of \$1-2 mills, which will pay all the liabilities of company, including \$2,200 of losses adjusted since Jan. 1. The losses for 1905 were about 65 per cent greater than in 1904.
