The full text of the plank in the platform presented and adopted at the Prohibition convention at Indianapolis, which created the greatest trouble, is as follows:

"That the right of suffrage rests on no mere circumstance of race, color, sex or nationality, and that where, for any cause, it has been held from citizens who are of suitable age and mentally and morally qualified for the exercise of an intelligent ballot, it should be restored by the people through the Legislatures of the several States, on such educational basis as they may deem wise."
