LAURIUM COUNCIL HEARS MANY REPORTS AT MEETING

Report of the Sidewalk Contractor Shows That Much Work Has Been Done During September—Pond Water Improvement Will Cost the Village Large Sum of Money.

No business of special importance came before the regular meeting of the Laurium village council last evening.

Action was deferred upon the applications of widows and others in extreme need, to have their taxes remitted, there being an unusually large number of such applications.

The council decided that John Hunt, street commissioner of the village, should be paid for services rendered during the firemen's tournament in the capacity of a night watchman.

The agitation which was mentioned in these columns last week, which aims to secure a shorter connection between Laurium and the county highway both on the north and south, reached the council last evening.

It was suggested that the village purchase a meter tester, at a cost of about \$100. It develops that some of the meters which have been installed by the village do not operate properly, and it is claimed that a meter tester would protect the village as well as the water consumers.

The council decided to pay \$250 of the money now in the special assessment fund upon the note which was entered into for this fund.

The report of Contractor John T. McDonald, who has laid the cement sidewalks in the village was received by the council last evening.

The funeral of the late Timothy C. Lynch was conducted this morning, with services at the Sacred Heart church at 9 o'clock and interment at Lake View.
