PAINE, WEBBER & CO.'S GOSSIP.

The Nipissing Mining company has declared the usual quarterly dividend of five per cent and an extra dividend of 2 1/2 per cent, payable July 20.

The LaRoe Cons. Mines Co. has declared the usual quarterly dividend of 2 per cent, payable July 20th.

New York, June 21.—The copper metal market has now developed stronger ton. Quotations for electrolytic now being 12 1/2 to 12 3/4 cents an advance of 1/4 cent.

Sales are reported at the lower figure in fair quantities largely to domestic consumers.

Although there is a good inquiry for copper for export, it is understood that some of independent producers who sold copper at 12 1/2 cents at the close of last week have refused that price and are holding for 12 3/4 cents which they expect will be the prevailing quotation within a day or two.

Boston, June 21.—A director and one of the largest stockholders of the Giroux Co. says: "I am hearing considerable criticism of the management of the Giroux company in planning so extensively for the future, without being sure of their ores. I know that Messrs. Cole and Ryan care not for this criticism. The Giroux has at its command, by reason of its affiliation with the Amalgamated and Cole-Ryan interests, the best engineering, mining and metallurgical talent, and they are preparing the Giroux for a large copper producer, both from the limestone deposits which greatly resemble the Ishbest veins, and from the porphyry. The first production will come from the limestone and these ores will go to International Smelter in Utah, which will need them. The Giroux company has about \$1,000,000 cash on hand, and every dollar expended is for the best machinery, and everything done is of the most important nature."

CLOSING GRAIN LETTER.

Chicago, June 21.—Wheat—Most sensational bull market in wheat in months was recorded today when there was an advance of 3 1/2 to 3 3/4 cents in the late months with last prices only a little under top. The extreme advance was established a few minutes before the close.

Corn—Best strength of the day was exhibited soon after the opening when July advanced to 60. After reaction of about half a cent under profit taking, market went close to top prices a second time late in the day and closed with net gains of 3/4 to 1/2 all around. Estimate is smaller at 179 cars. Cash prices ruled 1 cent higher. Dry weather over big states where much of the replanting crop is late is the chief influence.—Logan and Bryan, to Paine, Webber & Co.
