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FRESHMAN CLASS IN HIGH SCHOOL IS A LARGE ONE

The freshmen class which entered the high school this semester continues to grow and promises to be a record breaker in size before its growth ceases. Up to the present time the class has 156 members which is a decided gain over the freshmen class of last year. All the courses of the school are being taken up by the various members of the class while five of the number are taking special work. The Latin course leads in popularity, having a total of 54 pupils out of the entire class; the commercial and manual training courses come second with 39 students each; in third place stands the English course, numbering 25; while the engineering course has twelve members to its credit. The school authorities are greatly pleased over the large number taking the Latin course, as the majority of the students taking up this branch of work will go on to higher places of learning on the completion of the four year course here.

Another large increase has been noticed in the number of tuition students in the high school this year, their total numbering 124. They are distributed among the classes in the following numbers: Seniors 18; Juniors, 17; Sophomores, 39; Freshmen, 45; and Special, 5. These pupils are from outlying districts and are called upon to pay a tuition fee. The high school attendance still hovers around the 620 mark, although new students are being daily enrolled.

TO PLAY GAME AT MOHAWK.

It has been practically decided that the post-season cricket game between the Mohawk team, champions of the Copper Country League, and an all-star team, composed of the best cricketers in the other teams will be played at Mohawk, one week from tomorrow. A meeting of the executive committee of the league will be held early next week, at which time the personnel of the all-star team will be decided upon. It is expected the contest will be a very interesting one, as it is generally conceded that Mohawk has the strongest team that has won the championship since the introduction of the game into the copper country.

ONE OF OLDEST FRATERNAL SOCIETIES LOSING GROUND

While the Michigan members of the Ancient Order of United Workmen, which was at one time the strongest fraternal society in the state, reached the climax of their troubles more than a year ago, members in other states, where the society was at one time very strong, are now having difficulties. At the time the Michigan grand lodge went out of existence, several of the members in this region transferred their membership to the supreme lodge and they are still keeping up their insurance.

In Illinois, where the organization was for several years stronger than in any other state in the union, many people are talking of bringing suit against the society, in an effort to recover claims that should have been paid more than a year ago. It is reported that the organization is behind nearly \$100,000 in death claims. The supreme officers of the organization recently had a conference with Governor Deussen, and they are now trying to convince the governor that the society will be able to satisfy all the claims if the subordinate lodges of the state meet their obligations. 'The society' has been operating in Illinois since 1853. The constitution provides for the maintenance of a state grand lodge, which was to have control of the society's business throughout the state. It is said that the present trouble in Illinois will not in any way interfere with the workings of the supreme lodge, and any settlement that is made for the benefit of the beneficiaries will have to be effected within the state.

Much of the trouble in Illinois has been started through the attitude of the state insurance department, and the officers of the grand lodge believe that some of the old line insurance companies are behind the movement to put them out of business. It is said that \$90,000 of the nearly \$100,000 that is now payable on account of death claims is due from the guarantee fund of the supreme lodge, but the treasury of the supreme organization is temporarily depleted, largely through internal friction, on account of which the state grand lodge has refused to collect money for the supreme lodge guarantee fund.

SOCCER FOOTBALL HERE

Popular English Game Will Be Played in Calumet. There is some talk of playing Soccer football in Calumet this fall. A number of exponents of the game will meet in the near future, and under the direction of F. D. Sherwood, physical instructor in the Y. M. C. A. will get out for practice.

Soccer football is one of the most scientific games of football. The ball is never handled by the player unless it goes outside the field of play, and then only to throw it back again. The feet and head are used exclusively in this game, both in passing and advancing the ball. It is a spectacular game, and takes well with the American public, especially in the east and west where it is meeting with general favor.

LARGEST POST CARD.

Man Sends One 26x38 Inches, Paying \$1.20 for Stamps. Enid, Okla., Sept. 16.—What is believed to be the largest postcard ever mailed was sent today to a firm of attorneys in Austin, Tex. The card is twenty-six inches long, thirty-eight inches wide and weighs a fraction less than four pounds. It was sent by Isiah Armond of Enid who, having written several letters to the law firm and receiving no reply, determined to get an answer or be satisfied the communication reached its destination. He had the card made by a printing company. It is as large as postal regulations permit and required \$1.20 for stamps.

LAURIUM TO CIRCULATE PETITION TO BETTER SANITARY CONDITION

It is said the sewerage conditions in some parts of Laurium are not all what they should be from a sanitary point of view, and the civic committee of the Calumet Woman's club, which has had this subject in mind for some time, has prepared a petition to have the coverage wherever exposed covered so that cows will be prevented from coming into contact with it.

The civic committee states the petition will be circulated among the residents for the general benefit of the community. It is believed that much sickness is due to unsanitary conditions, and if the sanitary sewers are covered, and made impossible for cows to pasture to get at them, there will be a noticeable reduction in the amount of sickness in the village.

REV. ROMSDAHL ATTENDS Norwegian Lutheran Pastors Are in Session at Escanaba.

According to a prearranged program, the pastors included in the membership of the Marinette district of the Norwegian Lutheran church gathered in Escanaba yesterday and spent evening held the first of a series of evangelistic meetings in the Norwegian Lutheran church, of which Rev. Erickson was a married man, and is survived by a wife and three children, residing on Waterworks street, Blue Jacket. The funeral will be held Sunday afternoon, with services at the Swedish Lutheran church, and interment in Lake View cemetery.

Coroner William Fisher impelled a jury this morning for the purpose of inquiring into the circumstances of the man's death. It was ascertained that while proceeding up a slope, Erickson missed his footing and rolled to the bottom, sustaining a fractured skull and injuries to other parts of his body. The jury returned a verdict of accidental death, in conformity with the evidence.
