REDUCTION IN THE MORTALITY LIVES OF FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND CHILDREN ARE SAVED BY DIPHTHERIA ANTITOXIN.

Washington, April 12.—Statistics have just been compiled by Dr. John S. Fulton, secretary general of the fifteenth international congress on hygiene and demography, showing that the lives of 500,000 children were saved in the United States alone within the ten years between 1900 and 1910 by the use of diphtheria antitoxin.

CURRENT GOSSIP OF THE COPPERS By J. A. MINNEAR & COMPANY

NEW YORK APRIL 12. The character of the speculation the past few days, has been somewhat more diversified and mixed in quality and accumulation of stocks by the active commission houses.

On this latter very important point, it is a grave question whether the generally existing economic condition of things here, and the matter of the ever increasing World's gold supplies, joined to tariff problems, will not operate to prevent repetitions of the abnormal profits made in the past.

AMERICAN STOCKS OF COPPER ARE still at the famine point. Of course, manufacturers here have some running supplies, but scarcely one of them is stock ahead.

MAYFLOWER AND OLD COLONY. It was necessary because of soft ground to abandon No. 13 A hole at Old Colony. No. 14 hole has been started and is now well under way.

NORTH BUTTE. The annual meeting of North Butte shareholders will be held next Monday, and we are given to understand the report which will be submitted to stockholders will be much better than generally expected.

ADVENTURE. In the crocset being driven to reach No. 3 lode, Adventure this week broke into a vein carrying heavy mass and barrel copper, the width of which has not yet been determined.

CENTENNIAL. Increased production should be noted during the present month in Centennial's output, for the company is shipping very close to 400 tons of rock daily to the stampmill.

Among the Lake Superior non-dividend paying issues, Centennial appeals as an issue of great potentialities, and for one who is patient it will undoubtedly give large returns.

The drifts from No. 2 shafts as they approach the Wolverine boundary are very rich. An estimate of the territory available to Centennial on the Kearsarge lode has been made.

GRANBY. In a week Granby advanced about \$15 per share, the buying being inspired largely by the prospects of the early resumption of dividend payments by this company.

HOUGHTON COPPER. Houghton Copper at the close of 1911 had a balance of liabilities amounting to \$17,426.

COMMENTING ON WORK DURING THE past year, Pres. Chas. J. Faine, Jr., gives the following information: "During the past year the principal developments of interest on your property have been the two crosscuts from your shaft at the 450 and 620 foot levels, respectively, the details with regard to which will be found in the General Manager's report, dated January 29, 1912, printed herewith.

ABOUT THE FIRST OF February the lower crosscut was extended west through the lode cut in our diamond drilling operations and referred to in the last annual report as being worthy of further exploration.

THE COMPANY IS DOING practically no work on the 2,600 and 2,800 levels because of the extremely poor ventilation. The crosscut from the High Ore shaft of Anaconda has about 100 feet to go to hole through North Butte's lateral, and when this work is accomplished, ventilation will be very satisfactory making possible the resumption of operations in the lowest levels.
