Mr. Campbell and his assistants are getting up a pure-bred hog sale for the afternoon of the last day of the Fair. Hogs of any breed will be received for the sale, but they must be registered or eligible to registry. A small fee per head will be charged to defray advertising and other expenses.

Entries for this sale should be reported to Mr. Campbell by next Monday so that they may be listed in the sale catalog.
