While the locals were not having much decisions by the umpire, they were pulling off bonehead plays and costly errors, which seemed to feature the game. Both Dodge and Pyers pitched good ball, each team getting but four hits.

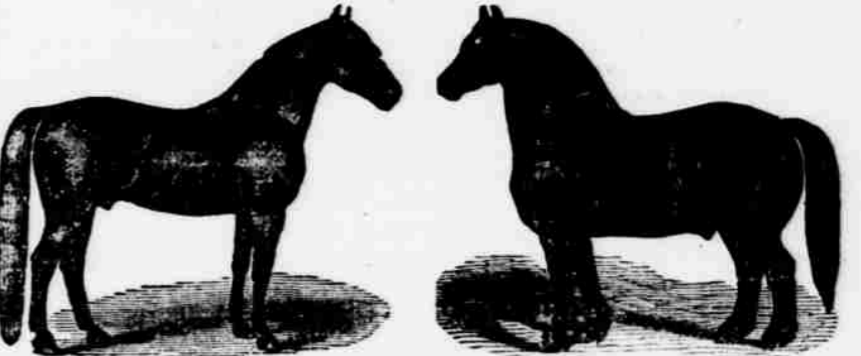
