But this was the great tidal-wave year, when the Republicans were everywhere washed out. On Tuesday the party was beaten in Ohio by prohibition, a purely local issue. But the returns so far received show that the Democrats have lost and the Resubilcans have gained ground."

DEMOCRATIC RULE IN ST. LOUIS. The manner in which the Democratic

party governs in large cities, when it is given full swing, is fully illustrated in St. Louis. The metropolition police law was pas ed by a Democratic legislature to take the power of self government out of the hands of the people. It was intended to make the police force a political machine to control the politics of the city in the in erest of the Demos eratic party. "he power to appoint the governor, and every Democratic governor has exercised the power thus conferred upon him in a strictly partisan sense. The sole object in selecting commissioners should have been to secure un honest enforcement of the laws against criminals, and to protect the lives and pro, erty of citizens. Nothing of this kind has ever entered in the minds of Democratic governors. They looked only to creating a machine which would be to their personal and party ben fit. The result is before the people of the st-te. The policy has brought shame and disgrace not only upon St. Louis, but is reflected upon the whole commonwealth. For years underthe appointment policy pursued by Democratic executives, gambling rings, jottery companies, policy shops and bawdy houses have had full sway, and have been under the special protection of the police of that city. Gamblers or their agents have dictated the appointment of the commissioners, and the latter have been their sub-ervent tools while in office. All will remember the days when the gambler Wakefield made regular monthly collections of sums aggregating thousands of dollars, from the gamblers and lottery men, and di-Hammers, Bits vided his spoils with the police commissioners Besides the Democratic campaign funds have in every canvass been constantly replenished by levies upon the gambling fraternity. Recent de ve'opments show that a coal oil inspector appointed by the governor, in league with a notorious blackmailer and perjurer had entire control of the police board, and secured the d'splacement and appointment of a chief of police at their will. Their correption was flaunted in the face of ever honest citizen until public indignation became thoroughly aroused, and at a meeting held last Saturday, which was attended by represolutions were unanimously adopted demanding that the governor remove Police Commissioners Lutz, Caruth and Cleveland, and Coal Oil Inspector Me-Entire The governor is absent from the state, but must soon return and respond to these resolutions. FRANK JAMES AGAIN.

Letters Found on His Half-brother |Displaying His Vicious Propensities.

A dispatch was sent from Kansas City Thursday night an ouncing the arrest at that pla e of John T. Samuels half-brother of the notorious Frank James, for shooting at a back driver named L. C. Daniels. Samuels visited Kansas City. and, getting bilariously drunk hired the hack late in the evening to drive around the city. At 11:30 o'clock he ordered the driver to take him to the bridge depot, and upon arriving there he jumped out of the vehicle and attempted to get away without paying the fare, and when the driver stopped him he drew a revolver and fired full at the driver's head. Daniels saw the mo'ion and dodged, and the bullet grazed his check. Patrolman Griffin heard the shot and hurried to the scene, and together with the driver overpowered the would-be murderer and conducted him to the station. A remarkable feature of the arrest was not reported last night, but has since developed. Upon searching Samuels several sensational letters from Frank James were found in his pockets. The letters were written from the Gallatin Jail, and were in substance that he (Frank) wou'd soon be out of jail and would be in the saddle again, and requested Samuels to hold himself in readiness at any time for business, and to have a good herse and saddle ready for him at a moment's notice. The letters were signed "Buck," the sobriquet by which he was known in the palmy days of the Jesse James gang. If Frank James wrote these letters he certainly has not half the sense he is credited with, as they, if genuine, betray intentions on the part of the notorious outlaw anything but penitent. Samuels is a tall, well-formed young man, 22 years old, and looks very much like Jesse James at the time of his death. He has only ast recovered from the bullet-wound through his body, re-
