Origin of "Keep to the Right."

A judge of the supreme court thus explains why in England vehicles turn to the left in passing each other: "The foot traveler passed to the right that the shield on the left arm might be interposed to ward off a treacherous blow, and have the right or sword arm, free to strike. Horse men, however, usually had mail to protect them, and there was more safety in being near the antagonist than in having to strike across the horse, as would have been necessary had they turned to the right. When vehicles came into use later drivers instinctively followed the old horse-back custom and turned to the left. In this country horses were scarce for several generations after the first settlers, and the rule of the foot passenger, 'Keep to the Right,' was the only one that obtained. When conveyances became common they still followed the more familiar custom of the pedestrian, instead of the forgotten traditions of the mother country."


