Two sons were born to this union, Dearborn and Charles Nelson. Charles died several years ago.

On Oct. 4th, 1907 she was married to Judge J. M. Hanna of Stanford, Texas. The funeral occurred Wednesday at 10 a. m. from the First Baptist church. The services being conducted by Eld. B. T. Wharton and Rev. A. R. Farris. Burial at Ridge Park cemetery.

Mrs. Hanna was a devoted woman, full of goodness and grace and always one to give comfort and peace to so many sorrowing ones. She was a great lover of music, especially vocal and always took an active part in the musical life of our city. For a number of years she was leader of the choir in the Christian church. As she was a gifted singer her fine soprano was often in demand. She was the soprano of the Milard quartette of this city.

Mrs. Durrett was one of Saline's early settlers and a member of one

of the pioneer families of the county.

Mrs. Durrett was the daughter of the late Jesse and Nancy Lankford, who were citizens of Saline county in 1817 and was one of the prominent families of the county. Her two sisters, Mrs. Lavinia Pemberton and Mrs. Hunter, and her three brothers, Garrett Lankford of Pueblo, James D. and George W. of this city, were very much attached to each other and as the years drifted by their affection for each other increased and the death of the loved sister, who was so tenderly cared for by them, has brought deep sorrow and grief to the surviving members of the family.

Mrs. Durrett was born at the old Lankford homestead in this county, seven miles east of this city, May 31, 1833 and grew to womanhood there. She was married to Wm S. Durrett fifty six years ago and it was a happy wedded life of over a half century for this couple. Mr. Durrett died two years ago last April. One child was born to this union, Mr. Frank Durrett, who with his family live at the old Lankford homestead.

The funeral was held at the First Baptist Church Saturday at two o'clock conducted by Rev. J. E. Cortner. Burial at Ridge Park cemetery.
