

SCHOOL CELEBRATES GIFT.

Students of Christian College Pledge \$3,400 Following Donation of Mrs. L. L. Culver.

Canton, Mo., Feb. 7.—In a two-day demonstration the students of Christian university of Canton have been giving vent to their delight over the recent gift of Mrs. L. L. Culver of St. Louis to the endowment fund of the college.

The gift consists of 100 shares of stock whose par value is \$100,000, bearing a dividend of 8 per cent.

The celebration began with a bonfire on the campus and closed this afternoon with a parade.

In a mass meeting today the students pledged themselves to give \$500 toward a fund of \$35,000, the remainder to be raised in Lewis county by the trustees, this fund to be used to endow a chair of modern languages as a memorial to Dr. Johann, the president.

Of this sum \$2,400 was raised immediately in \$100 pledges by the students. Most of the money was given by students working their way through school.

The recent gift of Mrs. Culver makes her third to Christian university. About a year ago she gave \$65,000, about the same time that R. H. Stockton, president of the Malestic Range company, gave \$75,000.

A short time later she gave \$10,000 more, making her endowments to the university as large as Mr. Stockton's. From these two donations a large building was constructed.

The gift of \$100,000 by Mrs. Culver is for maintenance purposes, and will provide \$5,000 annually. Two buildings named on the university campus are named for her. They are Culver Hall and Culver Gymnasium.

Met February 8. The Mayor and Aldermen All Present. Much Business Transacted.

Street commissioner files estimates of the cost of constructing sewers in sub-district no. Six of sewer district No. Two, in the City of Marshall as follows: 4,735 lineal feet of six inch sewer at 54 cents, \$2,556.90; 2,180 lineal feet of eight inch sewer at 73 cents, \$1,592.05; 2,251 lineal feet of ten inch sewer at \$1.40, \$3,151.38; 26 manholes average depth 9 1/2 at \$53.62, \$1,072.10; 4 drop manholes, average depth 16 feet, at \$86.62, \$346.48; 10 flush tanks, average depth 7 feet at \$88, \$880.00; 466 lineal feet, six inch connections at 20 cents, \$93.20. Total estimate \$9,692.21. Oscar Day's bid was \$9,119.2. A Jalek's Co. bid was \$8,355.50. Contract awarded to A. Jalek's Co. Ordered that Oscar Day's \$500 check be returned.
