## COUNTY HIGHWAY BOARD

In compliance with an act of the general assembly of the State of Missouri, approved April 17, 1893, the Saline county court at its May term now in session appointed a county highway board.

The following gentlemen composed the board: B. F. Brockway, Arrow Rock; Sherman P. Huston, Malta Bend; June K. King, Marshall; Frank Latimer, the county highway engineer is an ex-officio member.

There is one of these boards in every county in the state and they with the state engineer select the most practical road from the county seat to the county seats of adjoining counties or other large town or cities in the border county of the adjoining state. The purpose being to select a system of county seat connecting roads between all county seats in the state, said road to be known as county seat highways.

It shall be the duty of the county board to let by contract and to have dragged the county seat highway in their county.

\$15 per annum for each mile of road in each county has been appropriated from the general state road fund for the purpose of dragging or betterment of these county seat highways. The county boards serve without compensation.
