Military Company for Montgomery City.

The organization of a military company at this place, to be fully uniformed and equipped by the state, has just been authorized by the state authorities. A company of some 50 or 60 young single men is desired. If the company is organized, a suitable drill hall will be secured, which will be the permanent headquarters of the company, and meetings for drill will be held about one night in each week—likely Tuesday nights. The duties of the members will not interfere with individual business, and discharges can be procured at any time on change of residence, or on application approved by the company officers. Under the law the company officers must be chosen by ballot, a two-thirds majority being necessary to elect.

The company, if organized, will become one of the companies of the Fourth Regiment of the National Guard of Missouri. Each company of the National Guard has its expenses paid and receives pay in attending the State Encampments of the National Guard, which are held in some city of the state each year.

A meeting of the young men of Montgomery City and vicinity will be held at the Probate Court room at the Court House, next Tuesday night, Dec. 10, at 8 o'clock which time the matter of organization will be definitely decided on. Every one desiring to become a member of the company is invited to be present.
