

THE ALUM BAKING POWDERS.

Names of some of the Principal Brands sold in this Vicinity.

The discussion in the newspapers of the effect upon the human system from food made with alum baking powders and the publication of the emphatic opinions from noted scientists that such powders render the food unwholesome, leading to serious disorders of the stomach, liver and heart, have caused numerous inquiries for the names of the various alum powders.

Some time ago the health authorities of St. Louis made an examination of the baking powders sold within their jurisdiction. The names of the alum powders then found were reported and published. The following list is made up from this report, from the reports of the Agricultural Department chemist at Washington, the reports of the state chemists of Nebraska, Minnesota and Ohio, and from equally reliable authorities.

In Minnesota and Wisconsin of such importance do the Food Commissions deem the matter, that the names of the alum powders sold in each state are carefully ascertained and published, shading publicity in this state would be in the interest of the public.

In addition to those, it is feared that many groceries are selling what they call their own private or special brands. These powders are put up for the grocer and his name put upon the labels by manufacturers of alum powders in Chicago, Cincinnati, St. Louis, Kansas City, and elsewhere. The manufacturers, it is said, find their efforts to market their goods in this way greatly aided by the ambition of the grocer to sell a powder with his own name upon the label, especially when the grocer can make an abnormal profit upon it. Many groceries, doubtless, do not know that the powders they are thus marketing are alum powders which would be actually detrimental in many sections if sold with out disguise.

It is quite impossible to give the names of all the alum baking powders in the market. They are constantly appearing in all sorts of disguises and under all kinds of cognomens. They can be avoided, however, by the house-keeper who will bear in mind that all baking powders sold at twenty-five cents or less per pound are liable to contain alum, as pure cream of tartar baking powders cannot be produced at anything like this price.
