### B. Y. P. U. Convention.

The eighth annual convention of the Baptist Young Peoples Union was held in Slater this week, opening Tuesday and continuing through Thursday. The meetings were held in the Baptist church, the first evening session being opened with devotional service, led by Rev. Fuller, of Sedalia, and presided over by President W. J. Williamson, of Kansas City. Syd Burks welcomed the visitors in behalf of the city, and a talk was also made by Rev. Farris along this line. The response to these addresses was made by Rev. Campbell, of Kansas City, the following exercises concluding the evening program.

### New Telephone Company

The Saline County Telephone Company was incorporated under the laws of Missouri in the office of the secretary of state on June 16th and a copy of the articles of association of agreement filed in the Recorder's office of this county the following day.

The business of the corporation will be transacted at Marshall; incorporated for a term of fifty years, the purposes of the association are "the construction, ownership, operation and maintenance of a telephone system in the cities

of Marshall and Slater and in such other towns and cities in the state of Missouri, with such extensions and connections of such telephone system to and between any such towns and cities in said State, and to and between country residences and such towns or cities, as may be determined by said Company."

The board of directors for the first year are A. A. Wallace, R. E. Holloway, W. A. Beatty, E. H. Mitchell, A. E. Huston, J. E. Eubank and James Cooney.

The capital stock is \$25,000, divided into 250 shares of \$100 each, one half of which has been paid into the Board of Directors.
