MISSOURI STATE NEWS.
St. Louis was visited by a snow storm on the 30th which covered the ground to the depth of six inches.

Miss FRANK LOUAX, living twelve miles east of Clinton, threw herself into the well on her place the other day, but was rescued. She was insane from illness.

HON. SAMUEL L. SAWYER died at his home in Independence on the 29th of diphtheria, which attacked him only a few days previous. Judge Sawyer had been for years one of the most prominent men in his section of the State. For years he was judge of the Jackson County circuit court and represented the district in Congress from 1878 and 1879. He was born in Mount Vernon, N. H., November 23, 1813, and entered Dartmouth College in 1832, graduating in 1833.

NATHAN STANFORD, a colored man in the employ of W. B. White, a Hannibal dairyman, entered the lot the other morning when a maddened bull rushed upon him and throwing him down, pushed and rolled him a distance of sixty feet and then butted him through a wire fence. When found the body was literally mashed to a jelly and the man had been dead probably two hours. Deceased left a wife and nine children.

NEAR Clarence, Shelby County, the other day the eighteen-year-old son of a Mr. Gill was killed by the bursting of an old shotgun that he had overloaded and fired at some ducks.

FIDUARY, April 4, was generally observed as Arbor Day.

HENRY DOWNEY, aged fifteen, was killed by a train at St. Joseph the other night while stealing a ride.

The March report made to the Governor by the State Treasurer showed a balance on hand March 1 of \$1,500,941.69; receipts during March, \$212,000.29; disbursements, \$93,272.33; balance April 1, \$1,609,729.75. The earnings of the penitentiary for March were \$14,803.38, all of which were consumed in the maintenance of the institution.

The women of Farmington, St. Francis County, recently raided the liquor joints run in violation of law, and destroyed all the intoxicants found. A brewer's wagon was stopped going into the town and twenty-five kegs broken open and the beer emptied into the street.

The State Board of Equalization reduced the assessment of Jackson County thirty per cent on lands and increased the assessment on horses twenty per cent, and mules ten per cent. The total assessment real and personal of the county is \$87,600,618, a net reduction in this year's assessment of about \$29,000,000 and an increase over the assessment of two years ago of \$10,235,423.

The contest inaugurated by Miss Phoebe Conzins, ex-marshal of the Eastern district, against Judge Emerson, has culminated in the appointment of the latter's successor, Frank Buchanan, of New London.

The county surveyor of St. Louis County has been employed by the War Department to survey the large tract of land, containing 1,700 acres, at Jefferson Barracks. Under the authority given him he will proceed to mark out the metes and bounds, survey the sinuosities of the river bank, locate fences and buildings, and certain squatters, who are now occupying portions of the tract without any authority, will be deported. It is the intention of the department to either buy out or eject the squatters and convert the tract into an immense park. The east-bound express train on the Washburn road was derailed near St. Charles the other morning and five or six cars were pitched down an embankment. None of the passengers were killed, but over fifteen were injured, several having limbs broken. The mail car took fire from an oil lamp but the flames were speedily extinguished.

The Secretary of the State Board of Agriculture in his monthly report says the condition of the wheat crop will not exceed 85 per cent. The bad condition is due entirely to the severe freezing weather which was general in the State through March. The northeast, southwest and central counties have suffered more than have the southeast, while the northwest was least injured. Very heavy rains in southeast Missouri, causing overflow, have seriously injured large areas in the river counties.

The other day an electric light wire set fire to the five-story elevator of the John W. Kauffman Milling Company of St. Louis and the flames soon spread from the elevator to the mills adjoining and all were destroyed. The elevator and mills cost \$200,000 machinery and stock on hand were worth \$80,000; fully insured.

EDWARD BELFORD was thrown from a horse at the corner of Twentieth and Wyoming streets, in Kansas City, the other afternoon and the animal kicked him on the head after he had fallen upon the pavement, rendering him unconscious, and injuring him probably fatally.

LUC MOON, aged fifty-five, was probably fatally injured in St. Joseph the other day, by being struck on the head with a beer glass in the hands of Charles Bell, a bartender.

The handsome country residence of Colonel John O'Day, late vice-president of the St. Louis & San Francisco railroad, near Webster, one of the suburbs of St. Louis, was totally destroyed by heavy rains in southeast Missouri. All the contents of the house were burned. The total loss was about \$40,000, on which there was an insurance of \$25,000. The family was sleeping when the fire was first discovered and barely had time to escape in their night clothes.

NOTES ON NOTABLES.
MR. GLADSTONE has had six private secretaries, each of whom holds a salary of \$10,000 annually.

It is estimated that Stanley traveled 3,400 miles through Africa in the late expedition, all but 1,000 of which were on foot. The time occupied was three years.

DR. BROWN-SQUAMM is still engaged on his youthful elixir at Paris, and persists in believing that his experiments will at last be successfully established.

HON. PENNY BELMONT has received the decoration of commander of the Legion of Honor, in recognition of his services to the French Republic in connection with the Paris Exposition.

LEO XIII. has directed that his monumental tomb shall only consist of his figure recumbent in white marble upon a sepulchral urn of porphyry, on the sides of which are to be the statues of religion and justice; many of the popes prescribed their monuments, though Leo IX. did not leave any directions in regard to his.

JAMES A. BAILEY, Barnum's partner in the greatest show on earth business, is one of the richest men in the United States to-day and half owner of the biggest and most successful show of all time. It was Bailey who bred the first elephant and lion in captivity, who brought and boomed Jumbo and who bribed King Teobaldo to let the sacred white elephant leave Spain.

A Paris paper thus describes Louise Michel, who has been nick-named the "stormy petrel of French politics": "Her face flames with color, from the center of her ostrich-egg-shaped forehead; her untidy hair cascades upon her neck. She is dressed in black, and no ribbon, flower or jewel shows trace of feminine grace. Her eyes are not fierce; they are filled with tenderness—not that tenderness which is the origin of all socialism. For Louise Michel is more a socialist by heart than by reason."

The German Emperor rises early, takes a very light breakfast, and goes for a little exercise, after which he takes a second breakfast, this time of an omelette, ham and eggs, a mutton chop or a chicken.
