Since the publication of the above our attention has been called to the following statute of Missouri, being section 6085 of the Revised Statutes of 1879, and in the Revised Statutes of 1889, the section is No. 5,994, page 1,432, Vol. 2.

SEC. 5,994. UNITED STATES. TO PAY FOR USE OF JAILS. The United States shall pay for the use and keeping of such jails at the rate of one dollar per month for each person that shall, under their authority, be committed thereto, and also to the jailer, such fees as he would be entitled to for like services, rendered in virtue of the existing laws of this state, during the time such prisoners shall be therein confined, and shall support such of said prisoners as shall be committed for offences.

The last receipt for jail rent under the above law, signed by the treasurer of Cole county and filed with the county clerk was filed by W. W. Wagner, as sheriff, on the 22d day of November, 1886. The records show that W. W. Wagner paid during his term, on this account, as sheriff, \$209. The books fail to show, as we are informed, that Mr. Mahan ever paid in under the above

statute a dollar, although the United States officials say that there are almost at all times United States prisoners in the jail here. If Mr. Mahan has not collected what is due Cole county from the United States owing to his ignorance of the law, he is far from being a good and competent officer.
