CARLETON COLLEGE NOTES.

School opened at Carleton College on Monday, September 3, and though the weather was exceedingly inclement the enrollment was in excess of the enrollment for the first day last year in every department. The enrollment is not yet complete, but the following post offices are already represented: Farmington, Middlebrook, DeLassus, Flat River, Belgique, Licking, Patton, Knob Lick, Avon, Higdon, Caledonia, Bonne Terre, West Plains, Allenton, Doe Run, Leslie (Ark.), Libertyville, Irondale, and French Village. Several new students will be in within the next couple of days.

The special departments under Miss Woodwell and Prof. McFerrin are starting out with the promise of general advancement over the work of the preceding years. Miss Woodwell has introduced a number of new features that are of interest to all the school. General physical culture in the chapel work and general chorus work for the entire school are among the features that are of general interest.

The following are among the more advanced classes that were organized at the beginning of the year: First, Second Third and Fourth year Latin classes, First and Second year Greek, First year German, English Literature, Geometry, College Algebra and Physics. All these classes are larger than usual, and are exceedingly interesting.

Miss Woodwell is organizing several special lines of work. Among these will be a male quartette or two and also a ladies' quartette.
