

IOWA'S NEW PRESIDENT

DR. MACLEAN WILL BEGIN HIS DUTIES AUGUST 1. His Career as Student and Instructor - Interesting Educational News From Leading Schools and Colleges of the West.

Chancellor MacLean, of the University of Nebraska, will take up his duties officially as president of Iowa State university August 1. His inauguration will occur some time between September 22 and October 6, and is expected to be a largely attended and unusually brilliant. He accepted the call to the University of Iowa because he believed that there were greater opportunities to work. Iowa people are congratulating themselves upon his acceptance, and the board of regents is very enthusiastic and loyal in its support. His leaving is greatly regretted by Nebraska, as he has done a great work in the face

of the hard times of the last four years. George Edwin MacLean was chancellor of the University of Nebraska. He was born in Rockville, Conn., August 23, 1850. Dr. MacLean received his preparatory education in Westfield academy and Williamston seminary, Mass. He entered Williams college, from which he was graduated in 1871. He completed a course of study at Yale Theological school in 1874, and accepted the pastorate of the Presbyterian and Congregational Society, of New Lebanon, N. Y. From 1877 to 1881 he was minister of the Memorial Presbyterian church, Troy, N. Y. Going abroad in the latter year he studied at the University of Leipzig until 1883, with the exception of two semesters at the University of Berlin. He devoted his attention to philology and history. Biblical exegesis and old English literature. His collected series of Old English manuscripts in the British museum, Oxford and Cambridge. He made the degree of Ph. D. at Leipzig. After an extended tour through Europe he returned to the United States, and shortly thereafter accepted the pastorate of the Memorial Presbyterian church, Troy, N. Y. He resumed the duties of his office in December, 1882, but again in January, 1883, he was called to the pastorate of the Memorial Presbyterian church, Troy, N. Y. In 1881 he was elected the secretary of the Philological Society of the United States. He was also a member of the American Dialect Society, the American Forestry Association, an honorary member of the Whig Society of the University of the North American Bookkeepers' Association, and the Soci-

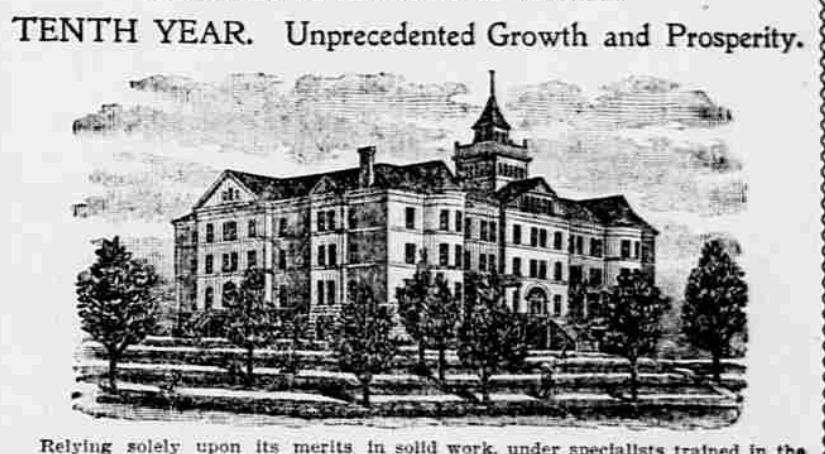

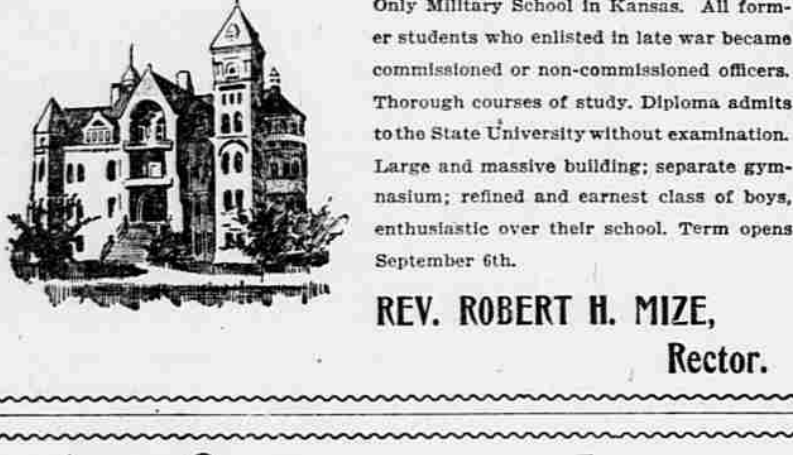

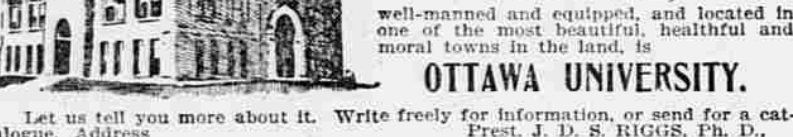
