HARDWOOD TREES.

One of the assuring announcements, among many that are otherwise, comes from California. It has been found that a planter of California mahogany (eucalyptus) can realize a profit of \$2,500 an acre in ten years, and that an acre of these trees can be propagated at a cost of from \$200 to \$300 an acre, including the cost of the land. The profit being so great, it means that an enormous area will be planted to such trees.

It is an established fact that several varieties of eucalyptus grow five times faster than any other hardwood and that logs of merchantable timber can be produced in ten years. The wood of this tree is equal in appearance to imported mahogany, native oak and walnut, and is equal to second growth hickory in strength and durability. These facts are fully demonstrated by the government. This industry is fast attaining large proportions in California. The demand for the lumber for such purposes as flooring, interior trim of houses, wharf piling, agricultural and wagon timbers, is greater than the supply, and the ruling retail price at the present time is \$100 to \$140 a thousand feet.

A fact that is unfortunate is that this tree will not grow in other states where it would be subject to frost, yet it is a matter of encouragement that the Californians are awakening to the possible shortage of our hardwood supply and planting large areas of this rapidly maturing and beautiful wood.

The lecture of Hon. Jas. R. Barkley at the city hall Monday night was one of the best things ever in town, but the crowd was small, and Profs.
