SCALP DANCE--PICNIC

IMPROVED ORDER OF RED MEN TO CELEBRATE

Greatest Day in History of Hayti Will be August 20 and 21--Barbecue and Many Entertaining Features for Every One to Enjoy.

The Prophets and the Sachems from the seven tribes of Improved Order of Red Men of this county met at the city hall at this place last Friday and perfected arrangements for a great Scalp Dance and picnic at Hayti on Friday and Saturday, August 20 and 21.

While other towns were anxious to secure the picnic, the warm greeting and cordial invitation extended the delegates by our Mayor, John T. Buckley, and the central location and railroad facilities of Hayti decided in her favor.

The features decided upon were:

1. A Scalp Dance, in which more than 500 Red Men will participate, more than 150 of which will be in full Indian costume.
2. An Old Fiddlers' Contest. [This will bring back memories of other days to many old timers. Ed].
3. An Indian Raid, picturing contest between the Indians and early settlers in the capture of a prairie schooner.
4. Balloon Ascension.
5. Indian Riding Races.
6. Indian Drills.
7. Sack Races.
8. Foot Races.
9. Woman's Race.
10. Ball Game.
11. Jumping.
12. Barbecue.
13. Council Fire.
14. War Dance.

15. Speaking.

The Ladies' Dixie Band of 18 pieces will be in attendance, as well as one or two more good bands, one of which will be the Indian Band.

The convention was called to order by the organizer, H. L. Davidson, who has the assurance of the Red Men throughout his territory that they will give their presence and assistance to make this the greatest attraction ever given in Southeast Missouri. Rates on railroads and river will be secured, and a general good time is assured to all who attend.

MURDER AND SUICIDE

Jealousy Crazed Man Kills Friend and Self at Concord.

Last Sunday at about 10:30 a. m., at Concord, in front of Harry Henderson's store, John Head shot and instantly killed Ott Bush, and then put a ball through his own brain, from the effects of which he soon died.

From what we can learn of the facts the deed was well planned, and that Head had stated to parties the day before that he intended to commit the act.

It seems that the two men had been friends, and even at this time Bush did not suspect any ill will, but both men were paying attention to the same woman, a Mrs. Donnie Kelley, and Head being of a more jealous turn of mind, allowed himself to become desperate.

The woman in question had been living in their neighborhood, but lately had taken up her abode in Caruthersville, it is said to escape the attention of Head, but both men were desirous of having her return to their neighborhood, and on Saturday both men went to Caruthersville together, horseback, bent on the same purpose.

On Sunday they hired a livery rig jointly to bring the woman back, but Bush accompanied the woman, Head riding horseback with the livery boy, who was to return with the rig to Caruthersville.

Head and the livery boy arrived at Concord ahead of Bush and Mrs. Kelley, and when the two drove up there was some words about an exchange of pistols that had been made, but not in an angry mood, both men were armed.

When Bush and the woman started to drive away Head fired four shots in rapid succession, all taking effect in the back of Bush, in range of the spin-column, causing almost instant death.

The shots frightened the horses, which were brought to a halt within about forty yards by the woman.

Realizing what he had done, Head made the remark to bystanders that he would kill himself, and walking down the road to where the woman had stopped the horses, and looking at the corpse of Bush, he turned away and fired a ball into his own brain, from the effects of which he soon died.

Dr. T. J. Trautman was immediately called from Hayti, but when he arrived on the scene Head was found to be beyond surgical aid.

It does not seem from the information at hand that the woman was to blame for the killing, and a strange coincidence is that two men were killed on her account in Dunklin county not long ago.
