

DENUNCIATION OF PHELPS-KERENS DEAL

St. Louis Republican Club Repudiates the Action of the Two Colonels.

ARRAIGNED AS LOBBYISTS.

National Committee Comes in for Censure—'Boodlers' the Subject of Last Night's Meeting.

According to sentiments advanced at last night's meeting of the St. Louis Republican Club, there is as much harmony existing between the members of the organization and the Phelps-Kerens faction as there is between a red rag and an infuriated bull.

Resolutions, tending with denunciation and reprobation of the Phelps-Kerens plea for Republican harmony, were unanimously adopted, and speech after speech, denouncing the unwarranted action of the two Colonels as "nothing but an effort to widen the breach in the Republican party" were received with enthusiasm.

The hall and patrons of the club were thronged with Republicans, many of whom, in denouncing the policy decided upon a few days ago in the Missouri Executive Council, are convinced to mean that such harmony as existed for Phelps and Kerens is not desirable among the ranks of the local Republican party.

The chief interest of last night's meeting centered about the indignation of the Board of Directors, by a committee, composed of J. P. Hayes, Jr., Charles J. Frazier, M. D., and others, in which it was as follows:

The time having arrived for the nomination and election of delegates to the Republican national convention, the St. Louis Republican Club considers it proper to express its disapproval of the action of the Board of Directors in its capacity as the club, and to make the following declaration and appeal:

We protest that the use of the name of the St. Louis Republican Club for the purpose of promoting the interests of any individual or group of individuals, is a dishonorable and unwarranted act, and we believe that any member of the club who engages in such a course, is guilty of a breach of the club's constitution and should be expelled therefrom.

We stand for clean politics, honest, clear and open administration, and for the election of men of integrity, honesty and high character to office, and we believe that the only way to secure such results is by the nomination and election of delegates to the Republican national convention, who are men of these qualities.

We call on our Republican fellow-citizens to support our candidates, and to elect to office those men who are men of integrity, honesty and high character, and who are men of the party.

We have read of the incapacity of our fellow-citizens, who have elected to office men of low character, and we believe that the only way to secure such results is by the nomination and election of delegates to the Republican national convention, who are men of these qualities.

We learn with great satisfaction that in the last few days certain members of our party and others who had nothing to do with the action of the Board of Directors, and who were not members of the club, have organized a railroad corporation and organized to forestall our honest efforts at the primary election.
