DETONATIONS THE LOUDEST EVER HEARD.

A sloop from the Island of St. Vincent which arrived here this morning reports that Mont Pelee's crater is now quiet, but that the detonations Saturday night were the loudest heard up to that time, and that the inhabitants were terribly alarmed.

Horrible detonations were heard, the ground rocked and quaked and articles on tables were thrown to the floor.
