St. Louis, June 11th. Remarks.—No important change has been observed in the market since Saturday, and in prices, very few alterations are necessary. There is now no animation in any article except tobacco, and the languid and dull feeling that generally prevails indicates a near approach to the termination of the spring business.

Tobacco.—This important staple continues to come forward pretty freely, and commands the same attention in the market as heretofore. The demand is very lively for all qualities, and though no positive advance has been established, rates have ruled very full for all descriptions, and in consequence of the increased receipts of fine manufacturing and shipping qualities, prices have ranged somewhat higher than previously quoted. We continue our last week's figures, however, as the range of the market—say for lugs 7 a 11; inferior shipping 14 a 21; fair, do. 24 a 3; fine, 34 a 44; fair manufacturing, 4 a 44; and fine, from 5 to 74c per lb. Sales since Saturday amount to 177 hhds., exclusive of re-views, which we quote as follows. At the Planter's Warehouse 1 hhd. Passed at \$7 20; 1 at \$6 30; 1 at \$6 60; 2 at \$5 25 a 5 35; 8 at \$5 a 5 05; 5 at \$4 60 a 4 75; 7 at 4 a 4 45; 16 at \$3 50 a 3 95; 12 \$3 10 a 3 45; 6 at 2 a 2 90; 2 hhds. Refused, \$3 70 a 3 95; 3 at \$3 45; a \$3 55. 9 at 3 a 15; 12 a 2 60 a 2 95; 10 at \$2 a 2 a 2 45; and 26 at from \$1 10 a 1 95 At the State Warehouse 1 hhd. Passed at \$8 60; 2 at \$5 65 a 5 75; 4 at \$4 70 a 5; 8 at \$4 a 4 50; 10 at \$3 60 a 3 95; 7 at 3 a 3 45; 3 at 2 35 a 3; 1 hhd. Refused at \$4 55; 2 at 3 a 3 10; 4 at \$2 50 a 2 70; \$4 at 2 a 2 10, and 6 at 1 30 a 1 95 per 100 lbs. Arrived this week 251 hhds., a considerable part of which was forwarded.

HEMP.—The market has been inactive and drooping since the commencement of the week, and prices particularly of the medium and inferior qualities and descriptions of dew rotted, have declined. We now quote inferior lots in loose order, \$55 a 56; medium and fair, \$60 a 65, and in good order at \$62 50 a 67, and prime light colored, in fine order, \$68 a 70 per ton. There have been but few sales, as holders rather than submit to a decline, have taken into store. Among the sales noted were 108 bales at \$70, 52 bales at \$68, 74 at 67, and several small lots at from \$55 a 65 per ton. Received this week, 608 bales.

Flour.—There is no change in the market, which continues extremely inactive, and but few sales have been reported. Wheat.—We continue to quote prime lots at \$68 a 70; medium and fair 62 a 65; and inferior descriptions which continue dull, at 45 a 55c, per bushel. Corn and Oats.—None received this week—corn will command about 28c., and oats 21 a 22c., per bushel.

Butter.—The demand for a good article is pretty active for packing, and the limited receipts keep the price firm at 6 a 9c per lb.

Beeswax.—The prices have receded a little, and we now quote 26 1/2c. per lb. as the top of the market. Hides.—The price is steady at our last quotations, say for dry salt 74c.; dry salted 7c.; green 3 a 3 1/2c.; and green salted 3 1/2 a 4c. per lb. Received 436.

Wool.—The demand is lively, and all qualities are freely taken at all prices within the range of our last quotations—say, from 16 to 28c. per lb., as in quality and condition. Received 23 bags.

Freights.—The rates have receded since our last, and the New-Orleans boats are now loading at the following; tobacco, \$2 per hhd.; hemp \$3 a 4 per ton; Flour, 20 a 25 cents; and beef, pork and lard, at 45 cents per lb. lead 8 a 10 cents; hides 35 cents; and other pound freight 16 a 20 per 100 lbs.; corn 7c.; wheat 8c. per bushel, and cattle \$5 per head. Freights are very scarce.
