Hogs sold yesterday at the highest prices since the war, so far as the bulk was concerned, with the exception of 1882, when heavy hogs reached \$9.35. Yesterday \$8.40@8.60 bought the bulk and the top was \$8.67 1-2. Packers participated in this lively trade and were suspected of bidding for a run next week. Supply this week is 50,000 less than they expected and prices have had sufficient advance to start a run if roads in the country get in condition for hauling.—Quincy Herald of Dec. 11.

Wood & Thomas brought in a car load of fat beeves Monday to ship to Chicago, but they found a 50c slump on the market and a prospect of another slump Tuesday. They had 1,000 bushels of corn and preference to shipping on that kind of marker they drove their cattle back home and will feed two or three weeks longer.

So far George W Tooley & Son are pleased with their silo. They report insilage in tip top condition.
