THINKS RENTS WILL COME DOWN.

Chief Reeves of Exposition Bureau of Information Believes Departure of Many Fair Workers Will Reduce Rates.

If the calculations of the World's Fair officials are correct, there is a good time coming very soon for the oppressed tenants of landlords who have taken advantage of an extraordinary demand to exact extortionate rents for their properties.

Charles M. Reeves, Chief of Domestic Exploitation, who has charge of the World's Fair Bureau of Information, and who is thoroughly conversant with the situation, takes the optimistic view that rents will very soon be decreased to reasonable figures.

These persons created an extraordinary demand for small houses and flats, which furnished the excuse for a radical advance in rent rates.

According to Mr. Reeves there have been but very few cases of extortion charges by those who have rooms to rent, brought to the notice of the Bureau of Information.

The bureau is preparing a new book containing the names of private families who will keep their homes open for the accommodation of visitors all during the Fair, and this will be issued in the near future.

RUSSIAN EXHIBITS READY JUNE 1. No Official Commission Reports Rapid Collection of Material.
