ARRANGING FOR GOVERNOR'S STAY

Chief Executive and Party to Remain Here After Celebration of Louisiana Day, Sept. 14.

MRS. BLANCHARD TO RECEIVE

She Will Give Series of Elaborate Functions—Yates Guest of Honor at Illinois Building.

Colonel A. Perrillat, aid-de-camp to the Governor of Louisiana, is now in St. Louis making arrangements for the Governor and his party, while they are at the World's Fair to celebrate Louisiana Day, September 14. The Mississippians probably will remain here a week.

Governor Newton C. Blanchard of the Pelican State is expected to arrive the evening of September 19 on a special train from New Orleans. Fifty members of his staff will accompany the executive, and other men and women in the party will increase the number of visitors to 150. The Governor and the members of his party will be at the Buckingham Club and Monticello Hotel, which are on King's highway, facing Forest Park.

The Governor will be accompanied by Mrs. Blanchard, whose social accomplishments are so well remembered by the social circle of Washington, while her husband was a member of the United States Senate. Mrs. Blanchard intends to give a series of elaborate receptions while in St. Louis.

Arrangements for the celebration of Louisiana Day are progressing satisfactorily, and it promises to be one of the most elaborate of the State days yet observed at the Fair. Governors of fourteen States and Territories have been invited to take part in the exercises, which will include a production of the Louisiana Purchase territory to the United States.

Gulch Drill Strikes Pure Water. Upon analysis it has been found that the water produced by the well of the Keystone Drilling Company in the Gulch is almost absolutely pure, only lacking 92 of attaining the maximum. The water is produced from two seams that were encountered by the drill at the 115 and 113 foot marks. The volume is not very great, but it is sufficient to supply the needs of all those who apply for a drink to quench their thirst. The well is especially being drilled to the 100-foot mark, where it is expected that a large flow of water will be struck. The depth of the well is 100 feet.
