

ACTRESS JESSALINE RODGERS RETURNS TO ST. LOUIS FOR AN ENGAGEMENT; LONGS TO LEAVE STAGE

After an Absence of Six Years Prima Donna Comes Back With Two Maltese Terriers and Advises Girls to Shun Footlights.

"I would be the happiest woman in the world if I knew I would never go into a theater again," said Miss Jessaline Rodgers, who has returned to St. Louis, after an absence of six years, to fill a four week engagement at the Edison.

"My father and mother were both in the profession, and I have played ever since I could talk. When I was 17 I played Lady Macbeth, or rather I appeared in the part and repeated the lines. I don't like to talk about my acting that part. I don't see how the house stood for me.

"I have lots of young girls come to me and want my advice about going on the stage. There is no use in advising them against it, because they think it professional jealousy. And when a girl has her mind made up to go on the stage the best way to cure her forever is to put her on the stage. So I advise stock work. If they stick it out for a season or so then there are lots of them amounting to nothing. They are, at least serious workers, but 75 per cent of the stage-levellers are cured by a six months course of stock training.

"I had such a dreadful time coming to St. Louis. I have two Maltese terriers, and I had to carry them in baskets, because of the car regulations relative to dogs. I would not leave Midland and Captain in New York."

"The dogs have a pedigree, but are not valuable as far as dollars go—that is, they are not worth hundreds of dollars. I have grown very fond of them, and when Miss Hill was just a little pup he was ill and I nursed him for six weeks. He was getting better when the house caught fire and he was overcome with smoke."
