TRANSFORMING ST. NICHOLAS HOTEL INTO OFFICE BUILDING HAS NECESSITATED REMOVAL OF ITS "LID"

Around the Edge of the Roof a Platform Has Been Built to Prevent Debris From Falling Into Street—Work Will Not Be Completed Before First of the Year.

Transforming the St. Nicholas Hotel into an office building has necessitated the removal of its "lid" and the erection of a platform around the top of the structure, which it presents causes hundreds of pedestrians to stop and gaze on the structure.

On top of the scaffolding a row of rafters, built in the shape of a fork, also is used to carry brick and lumber to the roof. The interior of the structure is almost as interesting as the roof. The partitions on each floor, which but a few months ago separated bedrooms, have been torn away.

When the building has been completed there will not be another office building in the city like it. Besides this it will be the only structure in St. Louis which has been both a hotel of prominence and then changed into an office building.
