DIES IN A TURKISH BATH.
 Wm. J. Cornelius, Modern Woodman Organizer, Succumbs to Heart Disease.

 William J. Cornelius, an organizer for the Modern Woodmen of America, whose home is in Nevada, Mo., died Thursday night in a Turkish bath room at Twelfth and Main streets. It was his first and last Turkish bath.
 Cornelius, who was on his way to his home from Mexico, Mo., where he had been attending a convention of his lodge, was induced by his companion, H. E. Ehretts, to take a Turkish bath. Cornelius, who was a large man, was not well and consented to the plan, although he said he had never before slept in such a place. After the hot room, Cornelius and his friend lay down to sleep. About 10 o'clock yesterday morning Ehretts awoke and turning to the cot where Cornelius lay called to him. There was no answer, and an investigation showed that Cornelius was dead. The body was turned over to Coroner Wheeler, who said that death was probably due to heart disease.
 Cornelius was 47 years old and leaves a family. He was formerly a conductor on the Missouri, Kansas & Texas road and is well known about the state.
