STATE OF MISSISSIPPI. EXECUTIVE OFFICE. JACKSON, July 14, 1875.

Whereas, It has been adjudged by the Supreme Court of the State of Mississippi, as announced in a recent decision in the case of "The State ex. rel. vs. Leblanc-French," that there is no law in this State requiring Tax Collectors (as such) to give bonds, for properly securing the revenue which may come into their hands; and

Whereas, Such a law is evidently wise and proper, and must have been omitted in the Revised Code of 1871, and subsequent legislation by accident or inadvertence; and

Whereas, From information received through the office of the Auditor of Public Accounts, it appears that many Assessors have been unable to complete and send to the Assessor the rolls for the year 1875, as now required by law; and

Whereas, Much doubt exists as to the validity and proper construction of the legislative act of this State;

Now, therefore, I, A. K. Davis, Lieutenant-Governor, Acting Governor of the State of Mississippi, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the seventh section of the fifth article of the Constitution of the State of Mississippi, for the purpose of giving ample protection to the taxpayers of this State, and an opportunity to every qualified voter of this State an opportunity to vote his ballot, do issue this my proclamation, commanding, in extra session, the Legislature of the State of Mississippi, in the Capitol, in the city of Jackson, at twelve o'clock, meridian, on Tuesday, the twenty-eighth day of July, A. D. 1875.

It is hereby declared, I have hereunto set my hand and the seal of the State of Mississippi, at Jackson, this fourteenth day of July, A. D. 1875.
