An Ordinance Authorizing the Borrowing of \$783.22 from the Merchants and Farmers Bank.

Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Macon, Miss., that the Mayor be and he be here by empowered to execute the note of the City of Macon, Miss., to the Merchants and Farmers Bank, for seven hundred and eighty-three and fifty-two one hundredths dollars bearing interest at the rate of eight percent from date hereof. The said note to be due and payable March 1st 1906, and being executed to meet the current expenses for said year. The indebtedness added to the current debt for the said year will not exceed the sum which the levy of taxes for said year may raise.

Sec. 2. Be it further ordained that the occasion being urgent, this ordinance be in force and take effect from and after its passage.
