

The Charter of Incorporation of the Glen Allen Cotton Oil Company.

1. Be it known by this charter of incorporation that C. P. Richardson, F. L. Mann, Chas. McGinnis, R. V. Garner, R. S. Wheatley and H. A. Mullally, and such other persons as may become associated with them, be, and they are hereby constituted a body politic, and incorporate under the name and style of the GLEN ALLEN COTTON OIL COMPANY, and as such may contract and be contracted with, sue and be sued, plead and be pleaded in all the courts of law and equity in this state; may have a common seal and alter the same at pleasure; may hold real and personal property, acquire and sell the same; make by-laws, and do any and all acts which corporate bodies may do not violative of the laws of this state.
2. The domicile of said corporation shall be in Washington County, Mississippi, and its principal place of business in or near Glen Allen, in said county and state.
3. The nature of the business, and the objects and purposes proposed to be transacted, promoted and carried on, are to do any or all of the things herein mentioned, as fully and to the same extent as natural persons might or could do; principal, agent, contractor, trustee, or otherwise, either alone or in company with others, and in any part of the world.
To erect, own, maintain and operate a mill or plant for the purpose of manufacturing crude cotton seed oil, and all kinds of by-products from cotton seed; to erect, own, maintain and operate a mill for said purpose, and also for the purpose of refining cotton seed oil and other oils, and to buy and sell cotton seed, cotton seed oil, cotton seed meal, hulls cake, etc., and to purchase, lease, maintain own and operate tank lines and tank cars, and steamboats for the purpose of transporting its raw material and manufactured products, and to do all business appertaining or incidental thereto, with the right to make legal and proper changes or alterations of said and refining oils, and for the use and hire of its cars and steamboats in the transportation of same.
And said corporation is hereby granted all such rights and powers as are enumerated in and conferred by Chap. 25 of the Annotated Code of Mississippi of 1902 upon corporations.
And in furtherance, and not in limitation of the general powers conferred by said Chapter upon corporations, it is expressly provided that this corporation shall also have the following powers:
To purchase, take, own, hold, mortgage, or otherwise lien, lease, sell, exchange, transfer or in any manner dispose of real property wherever situated, in so far as may be necessary or convenient in the conduct of its business.
To manufacture, purchase or acquire, in any lawful manner, and to hold, own, mortgage, pledge, sell, transfer, or in any manner dispose of, and to deal and trade in goods, wares, merchandise, and property of every class and description, so far as the same may be necessary or convenient in carrying on its business.
4. The books for subscription to the capital stock of this corporation may be opened and said corporation organized whenever \$15,000 of the capital stock shall have been subscribed, and the first meeting of the stockholders shall be held either at Greenville, Mississippi, or at Glen Allen, after this charter has been legally approved, and upon written notice to the incorporators herein named, signed by one or more of them, such notice fixing the time and place of such meeting, such meeting to be held not less than three days after the date of such notice, and when assembled the meeting shall proceed to organize the corporation in accordance with the provisions of this charter, fixing such time and place for stockholders meetings as may be deemed advisable, and determining the manner in which the business of the corporation shall be conducted.
5. The President or any three stockholders may call a special meeting of the stockholders at any time by mailing five days' notice to all stockholders.
6. The capital stock of said corporation shall be Fifty Thousand Dollars, which may be increased or diminished by a vote of the majority in force of the stockholders, such increase or decrease to be in form of an amendment to the charter, as provided for in Section 84, of the Annotated Code of Mississippi, permitting amendments to charters, and said capital stock shall be divided into shares of the value of \$100.00 each.
7. This corporation shall have the right of succession, for a period of fifty years, unless sooner placed in voluntary liquidation and dissolved by the acts of its stockholders, owing at least a majority of all the stock, or otherwise dissolved by authority of law.
