THE FARMERS' ALLIANCE.
 This organization of our farmers is no longer of doubtful import, but stands upon the solid basis of the greatest industry known to civilization, whose factors sow and reap the harvests wherever grown in this great country. The farmers have resolved to unite in a common brotherhood, and to stand or fall together whenever and wherever their rights or interests are antagonized by any other organization, calling or professing. They offer no antagonisms; but stand united and firm to resist the efforts of ringsters and corner-men who have too long fixed the price of what the farmer sells as well as what he buys. They do not desire to make war upon any other industry, but, on the contrary, wish all abundant success in their respective callings, so long as they prosecute them legitimately, and refrain from the attempt to regulate prices of the farmers' products when thrown upon the market. We assume that agriculture holds the highest and most important place in all the affairs in which man is engaged, and without which humanity would be wiped out in a day. With this fact confronting the American people, a majority of whom are engaged in agricultural pursuits, it is high time for concert of action by the factors employed in this great industry. But farmers must do more than simply cultivate their fields and gardens. To say that to understand the drudgery of farm labor in all its ramifications, is to dwarf the calling, and no enlightened agriculturist should be satisfied with this attachment, honorable and ennobling as it is. The farmers should do something toward building up and fostering educational institutions, for the general advancement of intelligence among themselves, that they may be able to rise rapidly to a higher plane of usefulness, and be better prepared to contend in the battle of life with other classes who make their living out of them by their wits. They will, we hope and believe, do all in their power to do all in their power to advance agricultural science, and for this purpose patronize as far as they are able agricultural colleges and schools of labor in our midst, and not neglect the literary training of their sons and daughters in the common schools of the country. The farmers will demand State and National legislation for the protection of their exports as well as imports specially affecting the agricultural products of the country. The programme of the farmers, if successfully carried out, will in the near future make this country more prosperous than ever before. This end attained, we urge upon all our farmers the necessity of beautifying their homes, making attractive to their children, and the exercise of a kindly influence over them while under parental control, and thus prevent their emigration to other localities and distant lands, or the abandonment of farm life for a clerkship or some other occupation called easy.—Southern Herald.
